DOUKHOBOR WOMEN.—A man named R. A. McKiggan, has returned to Woodstock, Ontario, from a two weeks' trip through Manitoba and the West. While there he visited the Doukhobor settlement, and reports that he saw women drawing ploughs in place of horses. It was a common sight, he says, to see sixteen women attached to a plough at work the same as oxen. The Doukhobor men, Mr. McKiggan reports, are a lazy, good-for-nothing lot, and won't work. Instead, they have resorted to the custom of the Indian, who, in years past, held sway over the country which the blissful Doukhobor now occupies, and let the women do the work. The men take all the comfort that's going. Complaints are to be made to the Government, and the Canadians who live in the same vicinity are much exercised over the thing.

A REQUEST.—Information is required in regard to the employment and occupation of women, their numbers, remuneration, success and all similar matters, the object being to submit this information to the next annual session of the National Council of Women at Hamilton, October 19. The scope of the enquiry is in regard to women in all occupations, professional, industrial, mechanical, in every way whether on the farm, in the office, in the machine shop or the workshop. Anyone under whose eye this may come will confer a favor by sending such information by letter addressed: "The Women's Council," P. O., Box 123, St. John, N. B. The special reason for the enquiry is that the Women's Council of Canada is about to prepare a hand-book for the Paris Exposition, in which the information is to be made available in order to show the standing taken in industrial occupations by women in Canada.
