**The Tuberculosis Boom.**

Sir,—The present Dominion Minister of Agriculture is a gentleman who may be described by the old-fashioned term, "born with a silver spoon in his mouth." Having engaged in farming and politics as a pastime, it is easy to understand that as "money makes the mare go" he has got ahead fast, and now holds the position Mr. McMullen, M. P., is much better fitted for. So unsatisfactory is the management of the Dominion Experimental Farm at Ottawa, under Mr. Fisher's supervision, that the Government has been petitioned by the Dominion Agricultural and Breeder's Associations to place a practical farmer in charge of the live stock and Agricultural Experimental Department.

It was expected when Mr. Fisher became Minister of Agriculture, he being a farmer and cattle breeder would have the skill to direct the routine of the live stock management so efficiently as to insure the most favorable conditions for the health of the cattle on the Dominion Experimental Farms. But when last fall, after three years of Mr. Fisher's rule, a fresh and malignant attack of tuberculosis was reported as existing on the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa, the surprise and disappointment was great. For if all the means at the command of the government is not enough to prevent such inroads of disease who may hope to escape? As after a little inquiry it was understood that the herd at that farm are kept stable constantly, the year round, the alarm abated, for practical stock men know that exercise and natural conditions are as essential to health in cattle as to humanity.

But now comes a sample of the stupidity of this man who cannot keep down disease in the cattle under his own personal supervision. He sends members of his staff to tell farmers how to care for their stock. One of the fundamental rules laid down by these talkers is that which would be kept close prisoners in their stables from early fall till next summer, thus totally ignoring the fact that herds so treated are the special victims of all sorts of disease and mishaps, tuberculosis being only one of them.

Then, to carry out the absurdity, the dairy expert is accompanied by a sprig of a veterinary whose orders are to preach the dangers of the identical disease the dairy expert has been giving directions for propagating. Such is the character of government meddling with agricultural interests as usually carried out. It is a question with most farmers whether more harm than good is not done by these staff officials. No difference what their personal opinion may be their public statements must be in accordance with the whim hobby of the head of their department. At the present time, there are indications of a determined crusade by the Dominion Minister of Agriculture against our cattle for the purpose of proving we have tuberculosis among our dairy herds. That would be pardonable if he was capable of keeping the cattle he has charge of in a wholesome state. But as he has failed to do so, we have a right to say to him "Physician heal thyself."

The truth is, Prince Edward Island farmers may not be just everything they should be, but they know how to breed and keep healthy cattle. Skilled veterinary surgeons tell us that they seldom see a genuine case of tuberculosis here. True, we have in mind the case of an unfortunate farmer near Mount Stewart who killed off nearly his whole herd of cattle under the mistaken impression that they were infected by that disease, but after investigation proved that the trouble with that herd was over application of Mercurial ointment for destroying vermin, the cattle afterwards being allowed to get wet and cold from which cause illness and sores followed. Cases of mistakes in testing with the tuberculin injection are known to be so frequent that its character as a reliable indication as to the presence of tuberculosis is now seriously doubted. At any rate it is unreliable.

But why this feverish dread of tuberculosis in cattle. The eminent discoverer of the germs of that disease and its identical character with consumption in man found it was as fatal to the lower orders of animal life as to the higher domestic animals, from rats and mice and poultry up to horses and cattle each and all being subject to and afflicted with tuberculosis, also wild animals, deer, rabbits, etc. He found, too, the air we breathe and the water we drink to be well supplied with the germ; so that at all times we are exposed to the danger of attack, making it impossible to say with any certainty how or when any consumptive sufferer contracted the disease. It is now acknowledged by competent observers that when tuberculosis occurs in the lungs it gets there through breathing air and not by either eating or drinking.

Cattle men, at one time, were very meek and accepted the decree to kill in all humility. But that day has passed. We now demand that the Government isolate human victims of tuberculosis, it being evident that they are the means of spreading the disease among cattle as well as among humanity.

The truth is but little is known as yet of the origin of this disease. But one point is fairly well proved, that is that it is not directly hereditary. That is the offspring of parents having tuberculosis are not diseased at birth, though they may have inherited that weakly constitution which predisposes to disease. On the other hand, the strong and vigorous may, by hardship or loss of health, be liable to contract that disease when their powers of resistance are weakened from any cause.

Let the cattle owners of this Province look after the welfare of their herds and see to it that no man, either with or without a diploma, meddles with his stock when they are evidently in good health. In case of sickness, should the "vet" wish to experiment then, as a safeguard, require that the owner be furnished with the proof of the presence of disease.

**By-law amending the By-law respecting Theatres and Public Shows.**

Be it enacted by the City Council, of the City of Charlottetown, that section one of the said By-law, be amended by adding the following words:

"Provided never the less, that it shall be lawful for the City Council, upon the application of the owners or managers of any Opera House, Music Hall or other Public Hall of any kind, to grant a yearly license for such sum as may be determined upon, by resolution of said Council.

**A Bye-law Respecting the Sale of Meat.**

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1. Every person publicly selling meat (fresh, salted or corned) by retail within this city in any store, shop, house, warehouse or other building or in the public market building or in or from any meat wagon, cart, carriage, sleigh or other vehicle upon the public streets or highways of the said City by retail or in less quantities than by the carcass, shall obtain from the Mayor thereof a License as a meat Vendor, and the Mayor is hereby authorized to issue such License upon receiving the License fee hereinafter mentioned.

2. The License fee shall be Twenty-five dollars per annum.

3. No person shall expose for sale or publicly sell fresh, salted or corned meat by retail or in less quantities than by the carcass in any store, house, shop, warehouse or other building or place or in the public market building, or in or from any meat wagon, cart, carriage, sleigh or other vehicle within the said City, without having first obtained a License therefor in manner above mentioned.

4. Any person or persons guilty of any infraction of any of the Provisions of this By-law, shall, upon conviction before the Stipendiary Magistrate on the oath or affirmation of any credible witness, forfeit and pay at the discretion of the Stipendiary Magistrate a penalty not exceeding the sum of Thirty Dollars for each offence, exclusive of costs, and in default of payment thereof it shall and may be lawful for the said Stipendiary Magistrate to commit the offender to the Common Jail of the County of Queen's County for any period not exceeding thirty days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid. Provided always that nothing in this By-law contained shall be construed to prevent persons from selling meat by the quarter on the public or market square adjoining the market building without such license, but all persons shall have the right thereon to sell meat of all kinds by the quarter on payment of the usual market tolls as at present or at any time hereafter may be provided. And Provided further that nothing herein contained shall be construed to require persons selling tinned or canned meats poultry or game to take out the License above mentioned.


