Tug Brings Two Scows To Montague

Yesterday morning the tug boat "Glen Livett 11" arrived in port at Montague under the command of Capt. George Chapman, of Murray Harbour.

The boat brought in two scows, used by the Dredge 115, which is expected to arrive in Montague in the near future. The Glen Livett left Charlottetown Wednesday afternoon and arrived at Georgetown at 3 a.m. and a few hours later in Montague.

The boat leaves today for Picton, where it will go on the slip for some time before returning to Montague to join the Dredge 115.

The news that the 115 is returning to Montague to complete the work of dredging out the river, began last fall has been received with satisfaction. With such a large dredge it is possible that the work may be completed late this fall and once again ships of heavy draught will be able to enter the Montague River.

"The system now being followed there in connection with the marketing of surplus potatoes for this past year is that of making use of the Agricultural Products Co-operative Marketing Act under which they set up boards which take delivery of the potatoes and pay the producer a certain initial payment.

"The suggestion was made a few months ago that the amount of 22 cents a bushel is paid by the people who process the potatoes into starch, and I think that is about the correct figure. It was also suggested that someone else was going to pay some other amount.

"Everything that has to do with that is written into the agreement. The agreement is with the Marketing Boards in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick."
