Mont Joli Hotel Gunned By Fire

MONT JOLI, Que., Aug. 15 — (CP)—Fire believed to have started in the cellar early yesterday gutted the Voyer Hotel causing \$85,000 damage.

Guests occupying the 30 rooms of the three-story frame building were awakened by the smoke and flames at 5 a.m. All escaped unharmed.

Mont Joli is about 200 miles east of Quebec on the St. Lawrence south shore.
