JOSEPH E. BOHME, the well-known sculptor, has been ordered to execute a statue of Lord Beaconsfield, to be placed in Westminster Abbey.

The Cochrane Ranch Company intend to put 8,000 to 10,000 head this year with 150 imported pure bred Hereford and Polled Angus bulls.

A HEAVY FAILURE.—Despatches from Yarmouth state that Messrs. Ryerson, Moses & Co., had assigned to Mr. Atkins, of Spinney, Atkins & Co. Liabilities, \$180,000.

It is stated that between four o'clock yesterday evening and two o'clock to-day the moon was in conjunction with five planets, viz. Mars, Saturn, Jupiter, Neptune and Venus. Is it any wonder we have stormy weather?

MONDAY last, being the fourth anniversary of the St. John fire, was commemorated by the Odd Fellows of St. John and Portland by a procession and memorial service, at which Rev. D. D. Currie preached an eloquent memorial sermon.

DR. HONEYWELL, of New Glasgow, who has been absent from the Island for a few weeks on a visit to his old friends in Ontario, has returned. We are glad to hear that the Doctor enjoyed himself so well and that he looks the picture of health on his return.

MR. G. M. BROWN, advance agent of the Palestine Arabs, who are now giving entertainments in the Provinces, arrived in the city last Monday and reports that his Troupe will appear in Charlottetown about the 6th of July. The performances of the Palestine Arabs are quite entertaining and highly spoken of by the Press of the Provinces.

RICHARD WHITTINGTON has turned up again in London—this time without his cat. He was appointed by the Bishop of London to a prebendal stall in St. Paul's Cathedral on the 21st May.

CANADIAN and American apples find an excellent market in England. The exports of apples to Liverpool from September 8th, 1880, to May 11th, 1881, were 862,144 barrels, against 296,862 for the corresponding period of the previous year. The shipments to both London and Liverpool during the past season amounted to 1,029,064 barrels. The trade is capable of further expansion.

MR. THOMAS ROBINS, Charlottetown's amateur carman, was accidentally upset out of his shell yesterday evening. He contested the speed of the "Southport," but after defeating her by almost half the width of the river, he struck a log in the river which precipitated him into the water where he remained until Charles McKenna and Mr. Phillips rowed out and replaced him in his shell.

THE "organ" was out of order on Monday. It was unstrung by the Nova Scotia news of Saturday night. Yesterday, however it was so far repaired that it was fit to grind out a few low discordant notes on the "Nova Scotia Elections." Let it grind.

HORSES.—A number of heavy horses are wanted by William Bagnall, Esq., to be exported to the United States this week. It would be well for farmers having first-class heavy horses for sale to come with them to the city immediately, where they will get good prices for them.

THE case of the City of Charlottetown vs. Edward Love, for encroaching on Queen Street, was examined before the Stipendiary Magistrate yesterday, and sent up for trial in the Supreme Court.

IN Dorchester it is said that Sir Albert's contribution to the Pictou fund for putting down bribery and corruption (a duty that always requires lots of money) was \$500 and that Mr. Burpee sent a like amount. It is also said that Sir Albert was very uneasy about the chances of the world coming to an end until he heard the result in Pictou and Colchester—after which he didn't seem to care much how things went.—Moncton Times.

ON Tuesday of last week, a little daughter of S. R. Wallace, West Nappanee, Ont., nearly three years old, got access to some matches in the absence of her mother, and seems to have eaten some or had them in her mouth, but no harm was apprehended at the time. On Wednesday the child took to vomiting, but soon seemed to recover. On Thursday she was seized with convulsions, and remained unconscious until Friday morning when death released her. A doctor was called, but was unable to do anything.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, June 20. The Dublin correspondent of the Times says the fact is evident that the Land League has received a series of heavy blows which are telling upon it and a more tractable and tolerant spirit is showing itself as the power of the local despots is broken. The strike against payment of rent is checked, the leaders repudiating any intention to adopt such policy.

In the House of Commons to-day, Mr. Gladstone, replying to the question of Lord Stanhope (Conservative), of which he gave notice on the 16th inst., as to whether representations had been made to the American Government in regard to the American organizations for committing outrages in England, said he was not aware what grounds Lord Stanhope has for speaking of preparations in America for outrages in England. There were incitements to outrages in three newspapers, etc., and viewing the returns of these incitements the Government thought it right to bring the facts to the knowledge of the Government of the United States.

The House of Commons, this evening, went into committee on the Land Bill. The amendment to the third clause, doing away with the distinction between present and future tenancies was returned. The amendment that the Government should extend the benefits of the bill to tenants who were in arrears of rent through no fault of their own, was withdrawn. Clause three passed without a division.

Prince Leopold took his seat in the House of Lords to-day as the Duke of Albany. Owing to the illness of Weston, very little interest seems to be taken in the contest at Marble Rink. Rowell drew further and further away, until he had, at 11.30 last night, covered 140 miles, when he took a long sleep. Weston retired at midnight, having done 85 miles.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

PARIS, June 20.

A despatch from Marseilles this morning says rioting continues at different points of the town. It is stated that eight persons were killed and twenty-three wounded; but in the hospital only two are dead and twelve wounded—three of the latter being in a precarious condition. Sixty-five persons have been arrested.

Jules Ferry, President of the Council, speaking at the Epinal, Department of the Vosges, yesterday, said the true problem at the coming elections was to eliminate a sufficient number of monarchists to prevent a coalition of monarchists and radicals from being strong enough to upset the ministry of republicans. The Canadian Credit Foncier opened a subscription for victims of the Quebec fire. In the Chamber of Deputies, to-day, the Minister of the Interior said fighting in Marseilles was begun by a number of Italian laborers attacking a party of French workmen. This caused reprisals and in the ensuing series of affrays, four persons were killed and seventeen wounded. He added every precaution had been taken to preserve the peace.

The Journal des Debates intimated the Italians were the first to foment the quarrel by hissing, but remarks that this did not justify the acts of the municipality, or the excesses which occurred on Saturday.

ROME, June 20.

The Minister of Foreign Affairs has instructed the Italian Ambassadors to Paris to demand protection for the Italians in Marseilles.

MARSEILLES, June 20.

It is ascertained that five persons are dead and two dying, seventeen are wounded and in the hospital, one hundred and twenty-five persons have been arrested and order appears to be re-established.

A deputation of French workmen went to the Julien tannery, to-day, and summoned the proprietors to dismiss their Italian employes. They threatening that in the event of a refusal 600 French workmen would visit the works to-morrow and prevent the Italians gaining admission. The deputation stated their action was resolved upon by syndical chambers. This affair has increased the excitement. Precautions have been taken to prevent the threat from being carried out.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, June 20.

The barque Queen of Ceylon, which arrived last night, brought the mate, Arthur Downs, of the ship Royal Charlie, before reported lost at Cape San Antonio. Downs was alone drifting in a small boat for nine days.

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., June 20.

The "Examiner" publishes an interview with Gen. W. H. L. Barnes, who states that the real Roger Tichborne has at last turned up and has told his story. Tichborne came to him for certain information as to how he could best obtain documentary evidence to show that he never had been in Rio Janeiro, and had never left there in the vessel Bella, and had never been wrecked and picked up by the Osprey, as stated by Arthur Orton, the Tichborne claimant. Gen. Barnes says he has reluctantly arrived at the conclusion that either the true Tichborne has turned up, or the man in question is the most adroit swindler he has ever met in a long course of practice. The Duke of Sutherland and Dr. Russell also had interviews with the man, and a full statement of the case was mailed to England by Dr. Russell.
