### The Political Side of Anarchy.

It is a pleasure to think that, some day in the dim and distant future—say a thousand years from now—the people will understand how they are being plundered by legalized specific privileges—by the monopoly of land and the monopoly of issuing currency, and many other minor monopolies. It is a pleasure to think that there are evolutionary forces at work which will eventually change our present industrial system by gradually curtailing the functions of government and making less and less the opportunities of the privileged few to exploit the many. It is but a pale and sickly pleasure at most, but it is better than losing hope. It is a grim practical joke that the workers who produce the wealth live in poverty and ignorance, while the idlers live in luxury and refinement; and the joke becomes both grim and ghastly when you realize that the fiercest opposition to any change comes, not from the privileged, but from the exploited class.

In my previous letters it was shown that the two main economic ideas of Anarchy were freedom of land and freedom in banking. Anarchy has also a political side—trial by jury.

Probably no king ever signed a grander document than did King John of England on the 15th of June, 1215. Perhaps no king ever signed a document which so clearly defined and specified the limitations upon his power than did King John when he put his seal to the great Charter of the Liberties of England. The main principles of the Magna Charta constituted the law of the land long before King John signed it, but kings found it convenient to violate this unwritten law of the land, and such violation once established was used as a precedent for still more violation. The principal benefit of the charter was that it clearly defined what a king could do and what he could not do. On account of the indifference of the people, or some other cause, by cunning assumption, precedent, construction and false interpretation, the Magna Charta has been continually violated or evaded, just as the American Constitution is being constantly tripped under foot by the American courts, so that it is nothing but a hollow mockery and a snare. Parliaments are powerless to restrain any government. The trial by jury recognized by King John in this Republic are two different instruments. True, the idea was taken from the Great Charter, but the grand principle embodied in the trial by jury is hopelessly buried. The people of England compelled their king to pledge himself that for any violation of his laws he should punish no one except with the consent of the equals of the accused. What did that mean? Did it mean that the king could make any law he saw fit, and enforce punishment on the transgressor, and the peers of the accused were merely for the purpose of finding out whether the individual had transgressed the law or not? Did it mean that the judges and jury were to be mere tools in the hands of the king to appoint and remove at will? That is the kind of trial by jury we have in this Republic now, only worse. I think you that the sturdy Englishman, with the king in his power, was satisfied with such a paltry rotten thing like that? Was it to obtain a charter that the whole people, as one man, united against the king? If the king could make any law he saw fit and enforce punishment, why did he grumble and say he was king in name? If that is what trial by jury meant I do not know what he was kicking about. If it was such a poor, miserable thing as that, do you think that now, after a lapse of over six centuries, men would lift their hats when speaking of the Great Charter? A government that can make what laws it pleases with power to command obedience, whether parading under the names of Empire, Monarchy or Republic, is invested with despotic power, and has nothing but fear of revolt as a check to its acts. When the Englishman demanded trial by jury, do you think he meant that the king could keep right on making law after law, and the business of the jury was simply to find out according to the evidence whether the accused had broken a law or not—the king to decide what evidence should be admitted and what rejected, with the understanding that ignorance of the law would excuse no one? Such is the trial by jury to-day. I take it that it was no such thing after the fashion of England were after. Englishmen did not mean the trial by jury to be a senseless farce. On the contrary, they meant that the peers of the accused should judge of the whole case on its merits, without any reference to the judicial authority of the king. The jury were to have entire control of the evidence, and were to judge of the law and the justice of the law as the people were required to obey. Thus, the liberties of each individual were to be in the hands of the king and placed in the hands of the people themselves. And that is why we venerate the Magna Charta.

Briefly, what the anarchist means by trial by jury is, that twelve men be taken by random from the whole people, without any selection on the part of the government; that these twelve men, without dictation from any source whatever, try the whole case, judge of the justice of the law and the advisability of the evidence. Such a trial fairly by a trial by the country at large, it is not a trial by the country at all, but a trial by government. The Magna Charta was a means in the hands of the people for preserving their liberties from the power of government. It was not stipulated by Magna Charta that the verdict of the jury must be carried out, but that no other verdict should be carried out. A true trial by jury would thus be a power to declare that the individual's liberty, property or life shall not be taken from him, but it is not necessarily a power to declare that it shall be taken from him. The government would not be bound to enforce the judgment of the jury, but it would be bound not to enforce any other decision. Anarchists plead

for trial by jury as derived from the common law and not any trial by jury the government may set up and call by that name. It is the thing and not the name that is wanted. The ordinary American is never weary talking of our "free government." But is it really a free government? Would you freely consent to pay taxes for the support of a government that would enact laws favoring some to your detriment? There are laws that all would voluntarily agree to contribute towards the support of a government that would see to the protection of life and property. But a man would be very foolish to freely contribute towards the maintenance of a law injurious to himself. Free government is supposed to receive its powers from the consent of the governed, having no power except such as all who support it consent that it may have. If the individual is compelled to bear the burden of carrying out laws that he believes to be unjust and injurious he is thereby robbed. As a logical sequence from the old cry of man seeking freedom that "taxation without representation is tyranny" arises the new issue that "taxation without consent is robbery." The cure for liberty is more liberty.
