The largest crowd of the season was on hand Saturday night at the racing park to see some great racing and welcome to the Island one new and one old friend.

The "new friend" was Sol Camp and the "old" was the top harness racing driver in the U.S.A., Island born Joe O'Brien.

Most of the big crowd was unaware that two such distinguished visitors were in the crowd until announcer Frank Acorn introduced them from the judge's stand and both were the recipients of heartfelt, sincere ovations.

It was a night mostly for favorites as the people's choices seemingly recovered from the shellacking they took last Monday night, finished as expected in most of the dashes.

Smith And Willet Win Titles In Tennis Play

Earl Smith of Summerside and Elizabeth Willett stroked their way to the singles tennis titles Saturday in the Island Closed Tournament at the Charlottetown Tennis Courts.

Smith is a former champ and ousted defending champion Paul Kays after four grueling sets. The new titlist won the first two sets 7-5 and 6-4 and was leading

4-0 in the third when Kays started a comeback and eventually won the set 7-5. Smith took the fourth set 6-4.

Elizabeth Willett emerged as ladies' champ after downing Jennie Boomhower in straight sets 6-2, 6-3 and Mrs. Willett and Bud MacAleer teamed up to win the mixed doubles from Walter Cullen and Mrs. Boomhower, 6-2, 6-3.

Her six-under-par final round also cracked the course record of two-under-par 75 she set in her first round Thursday. Men's par is 71.

Putting beautifully, Miss Stewart shot a five-under-par 32 in the first nine. In the back nine she sank a birdie on the par three 15th hole over a 165-yard fairway.

Maurice "Sparky" Lodge Wins 2 1/2 Mile Swim At Kildare; Three Fail To Finish

Maurice "Sparky" Lodge of Borden stroked to a strong finish yesterday afternoon in the two and a half mile swim between the Kildare and Montrose bridges, covering the distance in an hour and forty one minutes and leading his closest rival, Miss Martha Meyer, of Bloomfield by seven minutes.

Mrs. Elmore MacKay of Alberton was third, arriving after exactly two hours in the water, and Cst. Edward Hamilton, Alberton detachment R.C.M.P., who left twenty minutes after the other swimmers, completed the course in two hours and twenty minutes.

Heavy showers were experienced all afternoon but both wind and tide favoured the swimmers. The winner, Mr. Lodge, appeared as fresh at the finish line as when he entered the water and arrived at the Montrose bridge doing a steady sixty-six strokes a minute.

Three other entrants, Roy Hardy and Earle Atkinson of Alberton and the winner's sixteen-year-old son, Malcolm, failed to finish but were all well along before giving up.

Some excitement and concern was provided the large crowd who assembled to watch the start when one of the boats accompanying the swimmers was seen to capsize throwing the occupants, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Myrick, Jr., their two young children and a passenger into the water.

Other nearby boats quickly rescued the Myrick family and the passenger from the top of the overturned boat, and returned to the bridge. Occupants of about fifty cars braved the rainy weather to cheer the swimmers at the Montrose bridge.

Those accompanying the contestants in boats were Messrs. Roy Leard, Silas Rayner and Eric Corbett of Alberton and Mr. Robert Wilby, Fredericton, N.B. The contest was organized by Mr. Earle Atkinson, Alberton, who is vacationing at Riverside Cottages near the starting point.

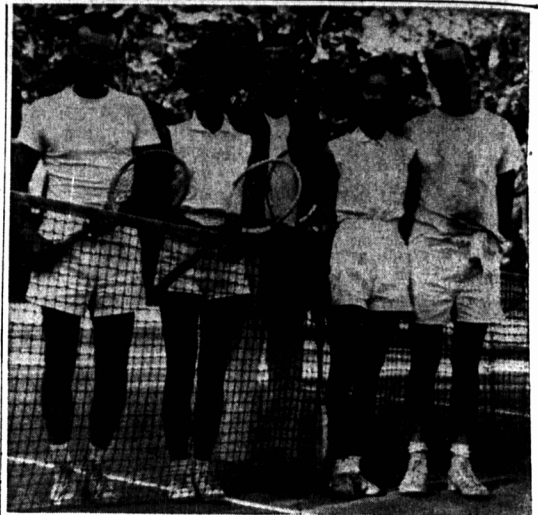

Centennial Aquatic Show Great Success Saturday

The Centennial Aquatic Show was a rousing success on Saturday as a tremendous crowd lined the shoreline in near perfect weather to enjoy immensely the swimming events and water-safety demonstrations and thrill to the acrobatics of the water skiers, who occasionally took a nosedive into the drink, and marvel at the speeds of the speedboats zipping along the surface at 40-plus speeds.

His Worship Mayor J. D. Stewart officially opened the afternoon's program at 1 p.m., after which the swimming races were staged.

Stadacona Navy took all honors in these events running up a point total of 43 compared to 28 for Cornwallis, four for the U.S. Navy and three for Moncton Y.M.C.A.

Stadacona also took most of the individual honors as three of their swimmers placed first with 10 points each. They were Uwink, Cox, and a lad appropriately named Swim. Pearson and Leonard of Cornwallis were second and third with eight and nine points respectively.

Following the swimming races LeMay of the U.S. Navy put on a great display of fancy diving, doing swans, backflips, half-gainers and many others.

The water-safety program sponsored by the local Red Cross was presented and proved highly informative. Mr. Henry Koryluk, Director of the Red Cross Water Safety Association of Nova Scotia, was the narrator as two young stalwarts performed the rescue techniques used by life-guards and showed a number of ways in which a swimmer, suddenly stricken by cramps, might get himself safely to shore.
