There will probably be seven or eight ships in Georgetown harbor which will furnish between two and three hundred sailors.

SAD AND FATAL ACCIDENT.—On Thursday afternoon last Mr. John Arsenault, of Wellington Station, met with an accident that cost him his life. He was with others engaged in moving a building at Urbainville, when some of the gear gave way, and a large whiffle tree struck him, breaking his left leg badly above the knee. He was taken home and surgical aid procured and everything possible done for him. About twenty-four hours after the accident, however, he became unconscious, and remained so until his death, which occurred about midnight Sunday night, the immediate cause of death being no doubt due to embolism in the brain. The deceased was only thirty-six years of age, and was much liked and respected by all who knew him. He leaves a wife and six small children, who have the sympathy of the community in their sad and sudden bereavement.—Summerside Journal.

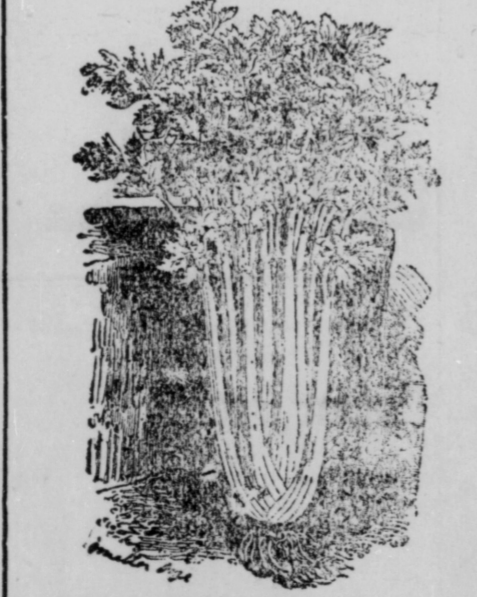
