The Prince Edward Island Hospital campaign to raise \$250,000.00 for urgently needed improvements in basic service facilities, is nearing a successful conclusion according to a statement made yesterday afternoon by J. David Stewart, the campaign chairman. The total in cash and signed pledges, according to Mr. Stewart, is now \$241,365.00. He further stated that the results from all committees of the campaign to date "have been excellent and very gratifying to every one interested in bringing our Hospital facilities and services up to the highest standards available anywhere".

Advance and Special Gifts solicitation, with the exception of four major companies doing business in the area, is complete with very fine results. Included in the total are the following large gifts and several others previously reported: Bank of Nova Scotia \$2,500.00; Bank of Montreal 2,500.00; Can. Bank of Commerce 2,500.00; Royal Bank of Canada 2,500.00; R.T. Holman, Ltd. 4,000.00; Maritime Central Airways 5,000.00; Canada Packers 6,000.00. The business and professional committee, under the chairmanship of Brigadier W.W. Reid, has reported, to date, less than half the prospect cards in this committee, and final returns are expected by Tuesday. Results in this division are very encouraging and indicate an enthusiastic solicitation by this fine committee of citizens in Brigadier Reid's division.

U.S. College Presidents Open Refresher Course In Thinking PUGHWASH, N.S. (CP) - A group of United States college presidents were to start today to "replenish their intellectual reservoirs" in the seclusion of this quiet town on Nova Scotia's north shore. The 12 presidents arrived here on the invitation of Cyrus S. Eaton of Cleveland, O., board chairman of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway. Eaton, a Pugwash native, last year opened his ancestral home as the "Home of Thinkers" and a group of prominent educationists, writers and industrialists occupied it the first summer. The college presidents are members of the liberal education commission of the Association of American Colleges. F. L. Wormald, assistant to the association's director, said "The aim of the eight-day session will be to replenish the intellectual reservoirs of commission members so that they may more effectively promote liberal arts education in their own institutions."

LIBERAL ARTS BASES Discussion, he said, will centre around the philosophic and psychological bases of liberal arts education. Between discussion sessions, the presidents will read thought-stimulating books by Plato, Jonathan Swift, Walter Lippmann and others. Discussion of college administrative problems is banned. Heavy Docket In Magistrate's Court

Appearing before Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet yesterday afternoon in Queen's County Magistrate's Court, two speeders each received a fine of \$10 and costs or ten days.
