FOR BREACHT CATTLE.—The Practical Dairyman and Dairy Stock Journal recommends a plan which ought to be effective: "Procure an ordinary five ring leather halter and surround and surround the neck of the cow with a thick five feet long and of a size not easily broken, bore a hole in one end and another from two and a half to three feet from it. Fix the end to the scrumpling and fasten the other to the leading ring of the halter with a string long enough to keep the stick about level when the cow has her head up. It will project about two feet in front of her and effectively keep her from getting over fences, and at the same time be of no hindrance in feeding or drinking."

POTTER COURT.—This forenoon, Philip Curley, and Fred E. Howe, were each fined \$50 and cost or two months imprisonment for a breach of the Canada Temperance Act.
