Sugar Beets in Maine.

The farmers of Presque Isle, Maysville and vicinity have lately had meeting to consider the proposition of the Maine Beet Sugar Co., who propose to build a raw sugar factory at Presque Isle another season, provided the farmers will agree to grow a sufficient amount of beets, for which the Company propose to pay \$4 per ton, returning the pulp to the farmers for feeding purposes. A soliciting committee has been raised concerning the work of which the North Star says: "As the towns in this vicinity are soon to be canvassed we sincerely hope our farmers will make an effort to guarantee the required number of acres, and thus warrant the Sugar Co. in establishing this important industry in our midst."

A Brunswick, Me., correspondent of the Maine Farmer writes:—Several of our farmers who have cultivated the sugar beet the last season are well satisfied with the experiment, and will plant more extensively another season. The yield here was at the rate of twenty tons to the acre, although it was late in the spring when the seed was procured, and they hope that by early planting another season to increase the yield and obtain higher prices per ton. They think it will prove a profitable crop as cash is paid for them on delivery and no dickering, and but little time required in marketing.

Vigorous efforts are being made to obtain relief for the unfortunate shareholders of the Glasgow Bank. Subscriptions are being raised, not only throughout the United Kingdom, but in Canada and the other colonies with that object. Several schemes of a more or less sensational character have been proposed to raise money. A proposal for a gigantic lottery of six millions, with prizes of three millions, has been received with favor by many influential people. The trouble is that the English people have had sufficient social gambling. Another scheme of an entirely different character is an association for compromise between the bank shareholders and creditors, the supposition being that many of the creditors would be willing to accept a moderate dividend, if paid immediately. A third scheme is the formation of a company for the speedy liquidation of the bank. By this organization it is held that the bank would realize from calls and assets over thirty millions of dollars, which would enable the liquidators to pay a dividend of ten shillings on the pound to the creditors. Meanwhile, the subscription lists in Scotland and elsewhere are being well filled, and many innocent victims will thereby be saved from total ruin.

The two methods of treating diphtheria, with chlorate of potash and hydrate of chloral, have been combined. Dr. Cesare Ciattaglia, of Rome, and as he claims, with remarkable success. He dissolves a drachm of hydrate of chloral in five drachms of glycerine, and applies it to the false membranes three or four times a day, by means of a camel's-hair brush. Of the chlorate of potash he gives from two and a half to four drachms a day, dissolved in four and a half ounces of water, to children of from three to six years, and an ounce to adults. With these medicines he always combines a tonic and restorative diet.
