Receipts and Expenditures of Canada.

The Public Accounts show that the Revenue of Canada, and the Expenditure charged against the same, for the year ending 30th June, 1884, are as follows:—

Table with 2 columns: Receipts (Customs, Excises, and Bill; Stamps; Other sources) and Amounts.

The Address to the Queen.

We have not published a lengthy summary of the debate on the resolution authorizing a joint address to the Queen, by both Houses of the Legislature,—for two reasons: first, because the facts and circumstances which impel the Legislature to adopt this course are fresh in the minds of all readers of THE EXAMINER, and need not be recalled; and secondly, because we deem it expedient that the minor differences which necessarily appear in a debate between the two parties should not, in this important matter, be brought into prominence. On the main point all are unanimous. There is not the slightest doubt in the mind of any one that the terms of our union with Canada are yet unfulfilled. There is not the slightest doubt that the Dominion Government have all along been strangely regardless of their obligation to supply means of efficient and continuous steam communication between this Province and the Mainland. There is not the slightest doubt that this Province, particularly, has suffered incalculable loss because means of efficient and continuous steam communication have not been provided. There is not the slightest doubt—twelve long years having passed away and petition and protest having alike failed to move the Dominion Government to do even that which is quite within the range of possibility—that the Legislature of this Province, as one of the contracting parties, is now justified in memorializing the Queen to interpose. The whole Legislature, and the whole people, those who support the Government and those who follow the Opposition, are of one mind on the essential facts of this case; and no difference of opinion as to the non-essential facts should mar our harmonious action, or lessen in any degree the certainty of the success of our appeal to the Queen.

The single note of discord and weakness which has been sounded by the Patriot might be damaging if the Patriot represented the views of the Opposition Party. But this, we are happy to say, it does not do. The puerile perversity of the Patriot is, indeed, openly repudiated by members of the Opposition in the House, and it finds no echo in the country.

A bill has been prepared by the Secretary of State, dealing with the Chinese question. The bill will be regulative in its character—imposing a tax on all Chinese who may land after its passage through the House, but will in no other way restrict Chinese immigration, while to the Provincial Legislatures will be left the right to deal with those Chinamen at present in the country, by imposing poll tax. This bill in effect is based on the report of Mr. Chapleau, who was one of the commission appointed to enquire into the Chinese question last summer. It will in no way meet the wishes of the people of British Columbia.

Erroneous Ideas.

THE Hon. Donald Ferguson, in the course of his excellent speech last evening, attacked (would that he could have swept away) several false and injurious ideas respecting this Province, which are prevalent throughout Canada. One of these was the idea, promulgated by Mr. Blake, that Canada has expended a great deal more money upon this Island than she has received from it. Another was Mr. Mackenzie's ridiculous idea that the Dominion had carried out the terms of union to the fullest possible extent. And still another was the idea, which had its origin among ourselves, that we were so straitened financially that we were compelled to enter the Dominion in order to avoid bankruptcy. In repelling this last idea, Mr. Ferguson pointed out that it was not the Province which was in straitened circumstances prior to Union, but some of the Banks of the Province, which, having departed from the rules by which banking is safely carried on and invested largely in debentures, got into difficulties as a matter of course; and then brought their great influence to bear upon the Government and precipitated the union. The Province could, no doubt, have survived the Dashaway Policy and raised the interest of its Railway debt, and the idea that we are indebted to Canada for stepping in and rescuing us from bankruptcy, is not only false, but calculated to damage our interests.

The Riel Rebellion.

THE news of an uprising in the Northwest came like a clap of thunder in a clear sky. We had had no advice of grievances or discontent on the part of our half-breeds; the insurrection must, therefore, be due simply to the presence of the unscrupulous agitator, Riel, and to the want of something else to do in the winter months. The accounts are no doubt exaggerated, and we hope presently to hear that the difficulty has been overcome by the police.

A resort to arms can be justified only when a people endure real grievances which constitutional agitation has, after repeated efforts, failed to remove. In this case there has been no agitation, and so far as the people of Canada are aware, no real grievances; and consequently, the leaders in the Northwest sedition should be severely punished when captured.

Mr. Hackett lately delivered a very able and forcible speech, in which he dealt severely with some of the erroneous utterances of Mr. L. H. Davies respecting the state of this Province, and proved by statistics that the Island has prospered and progressed since it was united with Canada.

The Manitoba Legislature opened on the 19th inst. The speech promises a measure to assist in the construction of local railways; also a liquor bill; a bill adopting the Torrens system of land transfer, and a bill providing for the ballot in provincial elections.

City Council.

A special meeting of the City Council was held last evening, when the Citizens' Bill, in amendment to the different Acts of Incorporation, 1883, was read clause by clause and agreed to.

A copy of the Waterworks Bill, defeated in the Legislative Council last session, being examined by the Board, it was moved by Councillor Koughan and seconded by Councillor Crabbe:

Resolved, That in view of the result of the recent civic election in this city, and the evident desire then expressed by the citizens for the introduction of an efficient system of waterworks into this city, that this Council petition the Provincial Legislature for the passage of an Act incorporating a Waterworks Company, giving them full power to introduce water into the city.

Moved in amendment by Councillor Morris, seconded by Councillor Douae,—

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Council that the best interests of the citizens would be served by the city authorities undertaking the construction of waterworks for the City of Charlottetown, and that therefor this Council does not approve of the works being entrusted to a private company.

On the amendment being put there appeared for it: Councillors Morris, Douae, McRae and Horne—4; and against it: Councillors Crabbe, Koughan, Kelly, McLean, Davy and Hazard—5.

The original motion was then put and there appeared—

For—Councillors Crabbe, Koughan, McLean, Kelly and Hazard.

Against—Councillors Morris, Douae, McRae, Horne and Davy.

It was carried by the casting vote of the Mayor.

It was moved by Councillor Douae, seconded by Councillor Davy,

Resolved, That the sum of \$100 per annum be added to the City Surveyor's salary, to date from the 1st April next.

Moved in amendment by Councillor Crabbe, seconded by Councillor Kelly,

Resolved, That Mr. George Douglas be appointed City Surveyor in place of Mr. Joseph Taylor, at a salary of \$350 per annum.

There appeared for the amendment Councillor Crabbe, Koughan, Kelly and McLean. Against it: Davy, Hazard, Horne, Douae, McRae and Morris.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

WEDNESDAY, March 25.

After preliminary business,—the adjourned debate on the resolution, submitted by Hon. Mr. Sullivan respecting an address to the Queen, was resumed:—

Mr. FARQUHARSON contended that the Province is paying more into the Dominion Treasury than it receives; and heartily supported the resolution.

Hon. Mr. FERGUSON combatted some statements of minor importance, made by Mr. Sinclair, and said that as an ardent Confederate, he had been bitterly disappointed respecting the highly important matter of communication between the Island and the mainland. Mr. Ferguson spoke at length to a crowded and attentive House.

Messrs D. C. Martin, Blake, Richards, McLeod, Lefurgey, Hooper, Alex. Martin, Beer and Arsenault prolonged the debate until a late hour.

The resolution was unanimously adopted, and a committee was appointed to join a Committee of the Legislative Council in the preparation of an address to the Queen, viz: Hon. Messrs. Sullivan, Yeo, Ferguson, Sinclair, Prowse, and Arsenault.

Newfoundland Troubles.

A lively fracas occurred in the Newfoundland Legislature the other day. Hon. Francis Winton, member of Parliament for Bonavista, and late editor of the Morning Chronicle, has been expelled from the Government and the position of Financial Secretary. He then joined the Opposition. The next day Winton entered the surveyor-general's office and met there George M. Johnson, law adviser to the Legislature and partner of Sir Wm. Whiteway, the Premier. An altercation ensued and Winton flourished a stick and finally spat in Johnson's face. The result was that Winton was so badly punished that he could not attend to his parliamentary duties for several days. Hon. Mr. Winton, who has only one leg, is referred to in a local paper as a "slave to drink in its worst form, who has gradually fallen from one degree of turpitude to another until every feeling of common decency and self-respect has been literally soaked out of his composition and a condition of depravity reached, which renders reformation all but impossible." The same paper, the Telegram says: "The miserable wretch has been offered money to leave the country."

Counterfeit Gold Coin.

A new counterfeit \$20 gold piece, double eagle of 1880, has made its appearance in Boston, and will, doubtless, be soon offered in the Maritime Provinces. This is a new branch of counterfeiting, as no coin of the double eagle variety has been attempted before, and the public would do well to guard itself carefully against this new specimen of the counterfeiters' art. This bogus coin is calculated to deceive most any one, excepting experts. It weighs 296 grains, whereas a genuine one weighs 516 grains, a difference of 220 grains. The coin was made from the mould of a genuine standard \$20 gold piece, and the metal from which it was stamped consists of about the same composition as counterfeiters use in making silver dollars. It is gilded brightly with gold by a battery, and is somewhat thicker than the genuine.

Prof. Wiggins Talks.

In response to a telegram from the Halifax Herald, Prof. Wiggins replied:—"The life of the meteorological bureau is at stake, and as they have charge of the storm telegrams you will hear nothing of the storm in Europe till the papers arrive, as happened in March, 1883. No telegrams in the morning papers here about the storm on your coast last night. The storm has occurred six times in the last thirty years, four of them on time and two hours late. It is not equal to the Sargy, but is very dangerous as it sometimes runs in veins."

The St. John Sun says: Prof. Wiggins' forecast was ignored by the Toronto weather officials, who carried their prejudice in his predictions so far as to neglect to notify the Maritime Provinces of the coming storm. And it is for this reason that Prof. Wiggins has scored a greater triumph down by the sea.

TRIED TO COMMIT SELF-MURDER.—A young man in the horrors attempted to hang himself in his father's barn, Woodstock, N. B., on the 19th. The hanging body was discovered by the servant, who with great presence of mind grasped and raised it as far as her strength enabled her, thus relieving the strain on the victim's neck until her cries brought help. The body was then lowered and after a long while the doctor succeeded in rendering the suspended animation.

CURRENT NOTES.

The American system of checking baggage on transatlantic steamers has been begun at Liverpool.

The Ameer of Afghanistan intends increasing his army to 50,000 men and fortifying the whole northern frontier.

J. D. Chickering, clerk of the LeFlore County Circuit Court, Mississippi, while out hunting on the 12th inst., was caught in a hail storm and was so severely injured by hail that he died before reaching home.

King Leopold in his address to the Belgian Deputies thanking them for their expressions of loyalty and confidence, said that such expressions encouraged him to continue his labor in the Congo enterprise. He felt confident of success, he said, and he hoped that Belgium would find another new outlet for her trade.

J. F. Baker, a farmer residing at Derry, New Hampshire, is the owner of a cow which has just distinguished herself by giving birth to a calf which, although it possessed but one head, had two perfectly formed noses and mouths. On each side of its head it had an eye, and there was an extra one besides in the middle of its forehead. The calf lived but a short time, but has been visited by hundred of curiosity seekers.

The bill incorporating the Niagara Falls Railway Company was read for a second time in the Ontario Legislature on the 19th, but on the understanding that the House was not committed to its principles. During the debate Attorney-General Mowat stated that the negotiations which had been in progress between the Local and Dominion Governments with reference to the establishing of a public park were at an end and that there was no prospect of their being renewed.
