Credit Union Annual Has Record Turnout

MORELL — A record number of 150 members and guests attended the 7th annual meeting of the Morell Credit Union in the village Hall, President Louis Morell, chairman.

Reports of past year's achievements were given by the president on behalf of board of directors; Cecil McCarthy reported 175 loans totalling \$33,000 in the past 12-month period and Alvin Eldershaw gave audit committee's report.

Manager Vincent Gallant gave a thorough report on operations for year ending Sept. 20, 1964, and stated that full time operations with accompanying services has made people much aware of the value of a credit union to the community and the resulting buying power of 200 members.

Managing Director G. Kelley of the P.E.I. Credit Union League, Charlottetown, spoke of the vast credit union picture encompassing almost 30 million members in over 31,000 credit unions outside the Iron and Bamboo Curtain countries, with assets in excess of eight billion dollars. He stressed that all should belong and support this community enterprise with all their monetary savings.

Striking Stevedores Considering Offer

SUMMERSIDE — Striking stevedores here late yesterday were considering an offer made them by local stevedoring firms yesterday morning at a meeting between the two factions. The stevedores, who have been on strike since last Saturday, have been demanding an hourly rate of \$1.50, 25 cents more an hour than the rate now receiving.

At yesterday's meeting the strikers were offered \$1.40 per hour plus a paid meal hour between 6 and 7 p.m. If they work until 11 p.m. or beyond that time they are given a free lunch.

James MacDougall, president of Coastal Stevedoring Ltd., pointed out to the three-committee representing the strikers that with this offer of stevedores working until 10 p.m. would earn \$19.20 per day. On the other hand, he said, stevedores working the same number of hours at the flat \$1.50

ALBERTON — Three Trianon fishermen sighted an unusual looking flying object while 11.30 yesterday morning while they were Mackerel fishing near North Cape.

Arnold Gaudet, Alphonse Gaudet and Eric McNis were about one and a half miles offshore from Sea Owl Pond when they saw a silver colored wingless object heading in an easterly direction at terrific speed.

Arnold Gaudet, from previous experience seal hunting by plane estimated the object to be flying at about two thousand feet at first the men thought it was an airplane until they suddenly noticed it had no wings.

Orange colored fins extended all around the object and it was estimated to be about 30 feet long.

It remained in sight for only a very short period before disappearing eastward.
