ALLSTON, Ont. (CP) — Wilhelmy (Willy) Weiler, unflinchingly faced the muscles on his well-proportioned 5-foot 11-inch frame and snapped: "Gymnastics is not a sissy game. It's nothing but sweat and hard work."

The questioner agreed. Gymnastics has given Willy the chest of a weightlifter, the arms of a village blacksmith, the waist of a ballet dancer and the cat-like agility of a superb boxer. His dark, eyes flash when people talk disparagingly about his chosen sport which, he says, is the basis for all sports.

The 27-year-old German-born Weiler is something of a celebrity around the huge Camp Borden military base where he's an army physical training instructor. He lives in a modest up-town house with his wife, Fay, and 2½-year-old son, Frederick.

WON EIGHT MEDALS

Improving Staff Recruited For Legion's Coach Clinic

 OTTAWA (CP) — Geoffrey Dyson has recruited an imposing staff for the Royal Canadian Legion's second national track and field coaches' clinic to be held in Guelph, Ont., Aug. 12-20.

Six British coaches, two from the United States and one from France and six from Canada will work under head coach Dyson during the 10-day clinic on the campus of the Ontario Agricultural College.

Dyson, former chief national track coach of Britain, is in his first year of a five-year contract to head the Legion's sports and recreation program, which is aimed primarily at developing better coaching for Canada's amateur athletes.

Baroness Wants Boxing Banned

LONDON (CP) — The Royal College of Physicians investigates them, the House of Lords debates them, the Icelanders want them abolished.

The days when a couple of fighters could "peacefully" belt the daylight out of each other and then go home, stoned up but solvent, are fast disappearing. These days involves a round of wrath from the ever-growing band of abolitionists.

An opinion poll conducted here soon after the death of Davey Moore in April showed that only 38 per cent wanted boxing to continue in its present form—56 per cent wanted safer rules and 18 per cent wanted it abolished.

This was a signal for Baroness Edith Sumner, fiery first lady of the anti-pugilist and author of the Ignoble Art, to reintroduce her House of Lords bill to have boxing banned in Britain.

She told the House—in which lives Marquess of Queensberry, once said that Iceland has always banned the sport. Sweden is investigating the possibilities and Belgium had drawn up a safer set of rules.

She considered the fact that the Royal College of Physicians was looking into boxing injuries as an important step and added that far from being a healthy activity "any psychiatrist will tell you it is degrading."

As happened to her previous bill in 1958, Baroness Sumner's bill was killed before its second reading mainly due to a statement by the government's spokesman, Lord Newton.

He said critics claim more lives are lost in the U.K. in the sport of soccer and rugby.

The baroness got an ally in Queen's Counsel, Lord Denning, who wrote that even "the most foppy moron" could see that while boxers fight only a few times a year cricketers and footballers play about 50 matches each and there are thousands more of them.

But there's one small hitch. Shortly after the 1960 Olympics in Rome, the Canadian Olympic Association decided to drop basketball, cycling, fencing and gymnastics from Canada's national team for 1964. These athletes had shown practically nothing in world competition but the COA left the door open for their re-entry.
