

X-Rays Shows No Injury To Leg

BOSTON (AP)—X-rays of injured Pete Runnels' left leg, proved negative and he left with the team Monday for Kansas City, the Red Sox said. It was not known whether Runnels, the American League's second leading batsman with a .334 average will open the Kansas City series at his second base post. Runnels suffered a left leg bruise in the first inning of the first game of Sunday's double-header when he was dumped by Detroit's Billy Martin in an attempt to break up a double play.

Canada's professional football teams, in both balls since the end of last season, emerge for their first official viewing before hometown fans this week.

The pros have scheduled intrasquad exhibition games to let their fans see just what kind of team they will be rooting for when the professional football leagues get under way in mid-August.

The games provide the additional purpose of allowing respective coaches to pare their bulky squads down to a playable number.

BOMBERS IN EAST
The three-week exhibition schedule kicks off July 26 when Calgary Stampeders journey to Vancouver to meet British Columbia

Lions of the Western Interprovincial Football Union. Football action in the East gets under way July 29 when Winnipeg Blue Bombers take the Big Four's Montreal Alouettes, in Montreal.

Hamilton Tiger-Cats, Grey Cup champions after a bruising final last year with the Bombers, don't get into action until Aug. 1 in Vancouver against the Lions.

In Toronto the intra-squad game for the Argonauts has been billed as a fight between three players for the number on quarterback spot. Competing are returnee Dick Shatto, homebrew Gerr Doucette and Ken Ford, an American import.

GOOD BACKFIELD
Out west the clubs are reported rounding into fine shape. Jim Finks, Calgary Stampeders

general manager, said his team looks "better than last year" but "I'm not making any predictions."

Ken Preston, club manager of the Saskatchewan Roughriders, said "we have a very good backfield—the best for quite a while. The line is the question mark at the moment."

Winnipeg reported a rash of minor injuries during the training.

Edmonton Eskimos roach Sam Lyle has warned his team that play during the next few days will decide whether some players make the team.

The WIFU schedule gets underway Aug. 14 with Edmonton at Winnipeg. The Big Four follows suit on Aug. 19 with two games: Toronto at Ottawa and Hamilton at Montreal. Both are Tuesday evening games.

Things Should Be Looking Up For Detroit Tigers

DETROIT (AP)—By all appearances things ought to be looking up for Detroit Tigers.

Jim Bunning, their ace pitcher of a year ago who stumbled through the first two months of this season, hit the peak of recovery with a no-hitter against Boston Red Sox Sunday.

On top of that New York Yankees are coming to town. The Tigers have a 9-6 edge over the mighty Yankees this season.

But things are not necessarily looking up for the Tigers.

In the first place, Bunning's no-hitter represented only one victory in a double header. The Tigers dropped the second game 5-2. At the same time the league-leading Yankees were thumping Kansas City twice.

WHAMMY FADING?
The business of the Tigers holding a whammy on the Yankees may go up like a wisp of smoke in a wind storm.

The last series—played at New York last week—indicates manager Casey Stengel may have solved the puzzle of the Tigers' mastery over the Yanks. The Tigers won the first game by a lopsided score, then lost two

close ones.

A sweep for the Tigers would revitalize their drive for second place. Coming home from Boston they were in fourth place, 15½ games behind the Yankees—the biggest difference of the season for the Tigers. They were one game out of third and 4½ games out of second place.

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Maritime Marksmen To Compete In Annual Shoot

More than forty marksmen from P.E.I. along with others from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick will line up their sights on the 200 yard targets Thursday morning. At 8:00 o'clock that morning the 86th annual Prize Meet of the Provincial Rifle Association opens at Squaw Point Range.

In addition to the above awards the Island sharpshooters will be battling for the twenty-three berths on the team which will represent the Province at the Dominion Rifle meet to be held in Ottawa during the second week of August. The twenty-fourth spot on the team is automatically taken up by Lieut. A. K. Mutch, who is a member of the 1958 Canadian Bisley team, now competing in England.

OPENING DAY
At eight o'clock on the opening day the marksmen will line their sights on the 200 yard targets in the Deobis Bros. match. To the winner of this event goes the 5 Signals Regt. trophy.

Moving back to the 300 yard firing mound the Prowse Bros. match will be fired, for the Navy trophy. This is followed by the Moore and MacLeod Ltd. at 500 yards, for the P.E.I. Regt. trophy and the President's match, 600 yards, 2 Militia Group trophy.

On the second day the grind starts to get tougher, the big event of the day being the MacDonald Tobacco Co., match, for

which the Artillery Association has donated as a trophy. This match consists of seven shots at each of the 200, 500 and 600 yard firing points, for a total of 105. Prior to the MacDonald match ten rounds will be fired at the 300 yard range, for the top honors in the City of Charlottetown and the H.M. Simpson trophy. The Rogers Hardware Company match at 600 yards winds up the second day's competition.

The marksman who completes the highest aggregate for these first two days will be declared the winner of the Village Restaurant prize. In addition the shooter obtaining the highest aggregate score in the six hundred yards ranges in both the Lieut Mary MacLennan prize.

DECIDE AGGREGATES
The activities of Saturday the final day of the meet will determine the placings in the Grand and Ottawa Aggregates along with the Nicholson Tyro and MacDonald Cadet Aggregates.

The first and third aggs. will be compiled after the firing of the Physical Fitness match, for the 5 Medical Co. trophy at 300 yards.

Placings in the Ottawa and MacDonald Aggregates will be decided by the results of the most important event of the meet the Jones Memorial match.

This match consist of ten shots at each of the 200 and 500 yards ranges topped off by fifteen shots at 600. Both competitors

finishing first and second in this match are the recipients of souvenirs.

OFFICIAL DUTIES
The meet will be conducted under the general supervision of the Secretary-treasurer, Lieut J. Stewart Moore. Working in conjunction will be the executive committee of Capt A.J. McCabe, Lieut. P.T. Hooper, Sgt. P.J. Landrigan and Sgt. Eric Coles.

The duties in statistical office will be taken care of by C.P.O. Stan Bowles and Mrs. A.F. Gormley. Activities on the firing point will be supervised by Major Roy MacGillivray, as Range Officer.

Action in the target butts will again be under the watchful jurisdiction of Mr. Squaw Point himself, Sgt. Art King.

At approximately 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, after the smoke has cleared and all scores are tallied, the presentation of trophies and prizes will take place in front of the Club House at the range.

VETERAN LAWYER DIES
