MacKinnon. HEALTH OFFICER

Health officer Dr. Wendall MacDonald in his annual report said that the indiscriminate use of antibiotics as contained in lozenges, toothpaste etc., should be prohibited. He pointed out that the continual use of the anti-biotics even in small quantities builds up an immunity to the effectiveness of the drug and when some serious illness is encountered, the antibiotic often acts in reverse. He said that the situation was causing concern to the medical profession.

No serious outbreaks in the City were noted by Dr. MacDonald in his report. The highlights of the year, he said, was the inoculation of school children with Salk vaccine. He hoped that during the coming year, most of the children of the City will have had Salk inoculations.

Protest High Truck Rates

KENTVILLE, N. S. (CP) - Directors of the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers Association Wednesday authorized a protest to Ottawa and Halifax over alleged high rates for trucks on the new CNR ferry Bluenose between Yarmouth, N.S. and Bar Harbor, Me.

The executive headed by President T. W. Aylward of Falmouth, N. S., heard complaints that it cost more to use the ferry than to drive around the head of the Bay of Fundy.

They passed a resolution asking federal and provincial governments for lower truck rates during the off-season for tourists. The present rate for loaded trucks is \$2.50 per foot overall.

Benson Urges Cut In U.S. Potatoes

WASHINGTON (AP) - Agricultural Secretary Benson recommended Wednesday that United States growers of the summer and late crops of potatoes reduce their plantings this year. He said an average cut of eight per cent below last year's level is needed to prevent over-production.

A big crop last year was followed by depressed prices and diversion of part of the crop into starch, other byproducts and livestock feed.

Planting guides - which are merely advisory to growers - proposed 1,005,200 acres in late crop potatoes, compared with 1,096,000 planted last year. The guide for the summer crop was put at 65,000 acres compared with 71,300 last year.

Sharpest cutbacks were recommended for Maine, Idaho, Washington, Oregon and California.

Immigration of Scots To Canada Protested

EDINBURGH (CP) - A brick was thrown through the window of a travel agency here, apparently as a protest against immigration of Scots to Canada.

The window was smashed shortly after a Canadian official had interviewed prospective immigrants. It was thought to be the work of a member of the Scottish Republican Army, a small group of radical nationalists.

In Glasgow, an official of the Canadian immigration office said a rock was thrown through his window recently.

He said the office "carried on as if nothing happened" to avoid giving publicity to the small group which says "Scots are not for export."

Auditor Notes City Needs No Refunding After 1969

Under the Municipal Grants Act the Federal Department of Finance has made a grant in lieu of taxes on Federal property, as the assessed value of same is in excess of 2 per cent of the total assessed in the City. It amounted to \$21,274.00 and is included with the Real Estate Assessment in the accounts.

As in the past, purchases of mechanized equipment were made out of Current Funds, the cost being amortized at the rate of 25 per cent a year. This year a street flusher costing \$11,300.00 was added.

The bank overdraft in the Current Funds was eliminated during the year by means of a \$250,000.00 Debenture Issue for Civic Purposes. Since the liability for this issue is carried in the Capital Funds, the Current Funds show a corresponding liability to Capital, which after other adjustments is reduced to \$233,333.65.

There is another extraordinary receipt which contributes to the surplus, an amount of \$36,724.00 received from the Provincial Government toward street work in the entrances to the City. This has been treated as a reduction in the cost of interest and sinking fund charges on Street Debentures, the same as is done with collections.

U.S. Trying To Put Bite On Yanks Salting Cash In Canada

By GEORGE KITCHEN Canadian Press Staff Writer WASHINGTON (CP) - The U.S. treasury is trying to figure out how to put the tax bite on Americans who legally evade U.S. income taxes by salting their cash away in Canadian investment trusts.

The U.S. on the other hand, has a 25-per-cent capital gains tax and American investment trusts must distribute 90 per cent of all their dividends, interest and capital gains or pay the regular 52-per-cent corporation tax.

An American investor can establish a Canadian investment company merely by complying with the terms of Canadian law.

ing U.S. taxes and at the same time reap the benefit of the lower Canadian tax rate on investment income.

Canada has no capital gains tax and applies only a 15-per-cent tax on dividends and 15 per cent on income from investment trusts.

The U.S. on the other hand, has a 25-per-cent capital gains tax and American investment trusts must distribute 90 per cent of all their dividends, interest and capital gains or pay the regular 52-per-cent corporation tax.

An American investor can establish a Canadian investment company merely by complying with the terms of Canadian law.
