Hawks Capture Maritime Title

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP) — Oscar Gaudet, the rookie skated by the sensational Moncton Hawks won the Maritime Senior Hockey League championship here Friday night with a comeback 2-1 over the Glace Bay Miners.

The victory before 2,515 fans in Miners Forum ended the Hawks' championship in straight games in the period to advance to the President's Cup semifinals in Allan Cup play.

Hawks, first place finishers in the Acadia Senior Hockey League, won the best of five series 2-0, easily taking the first two games in Moncton 2-0 and 5-1.

3 Title Bouts Slated Tonight

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Two world champions, welterweight Emilio Grifflit and featherweight Dave Moore, risk their crowns and a third title will be up for grabs tonight in Dodger Stadium.

The triple-title carnival, all over the 15-round distance, are scheduled for this one in the New York's Grifflit against the No. 1 challenger in the 147-pound division, Cuban-born Luis Rodriguez of Miami, Fla.

Moore, from Columbus, Ohio, goes against the No. 1 favorite in the 126-pound class, Sugar Ramos, another Cuban now based in Mexico City.

Raymond (Battling) Torres of Reynosa, Mex., will fight Roberto Curo in a 12-round bout for the Philippines for the vacant world junior welterweight title at 140 pounds.

EXPECT 30,000 FANS. Co-promoters Cal Eaton and George Parravano hope for a turnout of more than 20,000 and gate receipts of \$250,000 or up. Eaton will be the main opponent to get a crack at Moore's championship.

Grifflit, the highest paid performer on the bill with a guarantee of \$70,000, figures to be the main favorite over 25-year-old Rodriguez.

This will be the third time defense for Grifflit since he regained the championship from Benny (Kid) Parek last March 14 in New York in a 12-round knockout that led to Parek's death 10 days later.

It will also be the first clash since Emilio, then relatively young in that game, was dispatched still decision in New York, Dec. 17, 1959.

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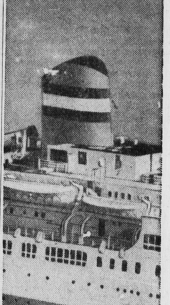
