

# Metro Committee Urging Dump Clean Up Immediately

Donald F. Stewart, Burnbury, was re-elected chairman of the Metro committee at a meeting held last night. Other members of the executive are Bennett Carr, West Royalty, vice-chairman, and Peter W. Moore, secretary-treasurer.

The Metro committee expressed gratification at the action of the city in the matter of the proposed erection of an incinerator. However, it is urged that something be done immediately about conditions in the present dump area. It is urged that the portion of the dump already filled in with garbage and refuse be covered over with clay as soon as possible in view of the approaching tourist season. A committee was named to approach the members of the government on this question.

As next week has been designated 'Clean Up Week,' the Metro committee is urging residents of the metropolitan area to co-operate by cleaning up their premises. It is also urging various government departments to clean up its haul roads and open shale pits, which the committee says are in a disgraceful condition.

## CNR Seeking To Close Sta.

The Canadian National Railway has sent an application to the Board of Transport Commissioners for permission to close the station at Vernon River for a six-month period each year from May 1 to Oct. 31.

Wes Kelly, CNR public relations officer in Moncton, said Thursday the reason for the decision was the fact that an amount of carload traffic handled by the Vernon River station, especially in the summer months, is very low.

He said the station handles an average of 2.5 incoming carloads and 5.0 outgoing carloads per month in summer, and that the amount could readily be handled by the Vernon station, 5.9 miles away.

## Six Glaucoma Cases Found At Lions Clinic In St. Peters

Six actual cases of glaucoma, which will require active treatment were discovered at the Lions Club glaucoma clinic held at St. Peter's Bay Holy Name Hall yesterday afternoon and evening. This is the second in a series of Lions Club-sponsored glaucoma clinics to be held so far in this province, bringing the total of 21 in all who will avert loss of sight and the total of those taking the test to 140.

At the close of last night's clinic, Dr. William Moreide stated that three were also several others which were borderline cases, and will be followed with further investigation in the near future.

Carrying out the tests in the afternoon clinic, Dr. J.P. Laize tested 125 patients. Dr. Moreide was deluged with 218 in the evening session. An additional 200 people had to be turned away because of lack of time.

Those unable to take the test at St. Peter's will be afforded the opportunity of attending a clinic to be held at Morel next week, the actual date and times to be advertised in the press.

Assisted by three volunteer nurses namely Mrs. James Lewis and Mrs. Roddy Pratt from St. Peter's, and Mrs. Coel McCarthy of Morel, the clinic ran smoothly and efficiently under the guidance of the two attending doctors, while Mrs. Roy MacKinnon of St. Peter's and

the St. Peter's Women's Institute served coffee and refreshments to those having completed the test, while attending Lions from the St. Peter's, Charlottetown and Paradise Lions clubs assisted in many phases of the clinic.

Finalizing last night's clinic Dr. Moreide said that "all persons suspected of having glaucoma as a result of these clinics will receive notification from the Lions representative" and urged the citizens in areas where forthcoming clinics will be held "to make a special effort to attend the afternoon clinics and prevent the overflow during the evening session as an effort to eliminate disappointment to those who have had to be deferred to future clinics."

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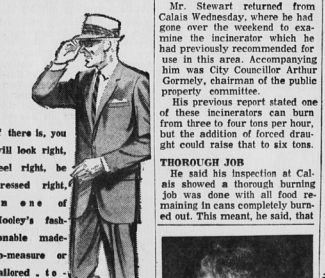
