Is New Coach

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP)—Zellio Toppazzini, a former National Hockey League performer who wound up his lengthy career with Providence Reds of the American Hockey League, was named coach of the Providence college team Wednesday.

Toppazzini, a native of Cooper Cliff, Ont., replaces Tom Eccleston, who retired at the end of last season after building the Providence school into a national collegiate hockey power and the 1954-55 eastern collegiate champion.

Toppazzini, a friend of Eccleston, started his professional hockey career in 1947, playing with Boston, New York and Chicago in the NHL. In the 1955-56 season, he was the AHL's leading scorer.

VERN HANDRAHAN, the only Islander ever to play major league baseball, arrived in Charlottetown Tuesday night here for a couple of weeks before heading for the Dominican Republic at the Winter Instructional League.

The Islander had his best season in baseball this year; having played with Kansas City A's for a part of the season and finishing up for Rochester Americans of the International League. Handrahan had a slow start in the majors but finished with an ERA of slightly over 4.00. His ERA at Rochester was a commendable 18.00, mostly through relief work.

"I had a good year," said Vern. "It sure makes you feel good to break into the big time. I think my biggest problem in the majors was that I was pressing too much—especially against the Yankees. The three winter instructional league camps helped me a lot, and I'll be ready to catch on with the Athletics full time in the spring."

Handrahan was given a few starting assignments with the A's, before manager Ed Lopat was replaced with another lefty. Vern was sent to Rochester on an agreement with another major league club. He was outstanding in relief there, but wasn't used for a period of about two weeks at one time because Rochester pitchers went the distance in 10 or 12 games. "And I didn't have a sore arm at any time during the season," Vern said. "I did have the flu for a couple of weeks and missed some work because of that."

Vern's contract was one of 15 recalled by the Athletics near the end of the season, but he and about 10 others were not used by the A's because this year's club is going nowhere but down. After a few days in Charlottetown, Vern and a bride to be, Anne Bradley of Charlottetown, will head for the Dominican Republic.

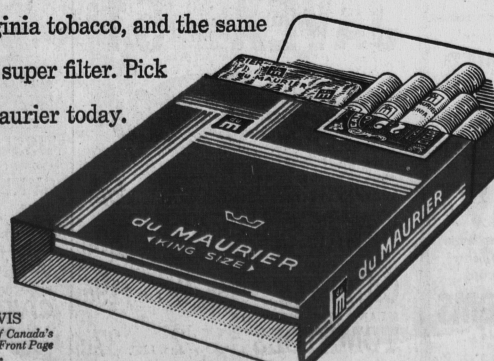
