Australians Dawn Fraser Completes Tripe Crown

TOKYO (CP)—Australia's Dawn Fraser completed a historic tripe Tuesday as American swimmers walked off with all the other swim honors on the third day of Olympic competition.

The Aussie star finished home in the 100-meter freestyle in an Olympic record of 59.8 seconds, becoming the first swimmer ever to win the same event in three successive Olympic games.

Two American girls followed her. And another American, Jed Graef, led a sweep for his team in the 200-meter backstroke with a world record time of 2:10.4.

The third gold of the day went to Polish weightlifter, Waldemar Baszanowski, 29 years old - old physical education teacher who topped Russia's Vladimir Kaplunov in the light weight class.

The results left the Americans far out in front in the unofficial national standings with 47 points to 23 for Russia and 22 for the U.S. on the team, which faced fifth place competition today.

Canada, with two points, was tied with four other countries in 11th place following a disappointing day in which its eight medal crew and endless hours were eliminated in the rowing competition.

Two Canadian points came as Marion Lay, one of two Canadian-born residents of the U.S. on the team, placed fifth behind Miss Fraser in the 100-meter freestyle. Miss Lay, a slight blonde, 19-year-old, was born in Vancouver but moved to California at the age of five.

Miss Fraser won the event by about two feet over Sharon Stouck of the U.S., who joined Baszanowski also set a world record of 59.8. A merica's Kathy Ellis took the bronze medal and Erica Terpstra of the Netherlands was fourth.
