

# Parkdale Nips B.Y.C. 6-4

## O. Carver and Bob Hurry Score in Overtime Period

Parkdale Flyers took a 3-2 lead in the Island Senior Hockey League semi-final playoff by edging Basilea Youth Club 6-3 in a thrilling overtime battle at the Sports Arena last night.

Orin Carver and Bob Hurry fired the two goals in the 10 minute extra session that gave the Flyers their third win.

Buck Whitlock's third goal of the evening with less than three minutes left to play sent the game into overtime. This caps the third straight overtime game in this series.

Orin Carver shot two goals and picked up an assist to pace the Flyers. Skip Carver opened the scoring in the first period and Jim MacLeod and Erland Wood fired the other Parkdale goals.

The Flyers blew a 2-0 lead but were in front 3-2 at the end of the first. Two goals were split evenly in the second and Whitlock's goal tied the game in the third.

Skip Carver got the Flyers off and running at 3:13 of the first when he connected on a shot in Willie Dunn. Six minutes later Jim MacLeod took advantage of some B.Y.C. carelessness play around their own net to send the Flyers into a 2-0 lead.

# Red Wings Blast Boston 7-2 To Even Series At 1-1

DETROIT (AP) — Detroit Red Wings squared their Stanley Cup hockey series playoff Thursday night with Boston at one game apiece, battering the Bruins 7-2 in a viciously played contest in which 22 penalties were called.

Aroused by the stinging criticism by club officials that followed their loss two nights ago and by the first period injury to goalie Glenn Hall, the Red Wings skated furiously in their most aggressive play of the season.

Gordie Howe, the National Hockey League's leading scorer, scored one goal and assisted on two others as the Wings rammed shot after shot past rookie goalie on Simmons who held them to one goal in the opener.

Howe's two assists gave him a total of 45 in Stanley Cup play-offs, tying the record set by Elmer Lach, Montreal Canadian centre star, in 11 playoff seasons. This also is Howe's 11th season in the playoffs.

There were half a dozen fights and twice as many near-fights in the bitter struggle. The game was stopped numerous times because of the first swinging.

Just as the title-winning Wings could do nothing right in the opener, they could do nothing wrong Thursday night.

With Hall—despite a first period cut across his upper lip that required 18 stitches to close—turning back one Bruin rush after another with catlike movements in the net, the Detroit club beat Boston at its own hard-charging style of play.

Now, after a full season of hockey, all other imports are gone from the player rosters and Shepherd has established himself as one of the key men in the Summerside attack. The little fellow gets better and better each game.

He looked mighty fragile from the rough and tough going, but he played an aggressive game and seemed to be able to elude the checks thrown his way.

Isaac Walker, the proprietor of the Kensington Rink, is certainly making a lot of improvements in the structure, and Isaac is still planning to make it even better. There are seats all around the rink now, the entrance has the springing doors much the same as the Bedouque rink, and a side exit door has been added. We certainly enjoyed Isaac's hospitality, and would like to make another visit there before the season closes.
