

Saints Show Scoring Power In 25-2 Win Over P.W.C.

Showing great scoring power in both halves, Saint Dunstan's University second year squad ran over P. W. C. 25-2 yesterday afternoon at the Queen Charlotte High Field to take a one game lead in the best of three series for the Zakem trophy.

The Saints were led on the attack by a Summerside boy Johnny Whelan who went over for three first half tries. Peter Green and George McGuigan each went over the line once and booted a convert while Ed Morrison and Donnie LeClair got the other tries.

The Welshmen's 2 points came in a penalty kick by Dave Mac-

Leod late in the second half. The Saints raced to the attack from the kickoff and hemmed P. W. C. into its own end with some nifty tackling and slight of hand ball handling by Chick Morrison.

The Welshmen defenders were given no moments of leisure at all and even after Whelan crossed the line on the end of a nice passing play from a scrum with MacNeil and Green the Saints kept pressing hard. Minutes later Whelan was back again for another try and Ed Morrison pushed S. D. U. 9 points in front with a dash from inside the P. W. C. 25 yard mark.

Whelan came through once more before the end of the half and George McGuigan made no mistake on the convert attempt to give S. D. U. a 14-0 lead as the whistle sounded the end of the half.

At this point the Welshmen fought back hard and an awarded penalty kick on the Saints' 30 yard line gave P. W. C. its chance to get on the score sheet. Dave MacLeod, who was playing a really fine game for the Welshmen, came through in great style and the score read 20-2.

The Saints came roaring back more determined than ever and in the dying moments of the game McGuigan went across the Welshmen line with three defenders on his back for the seventh S. D. U. try of the game and Peter Green made the convert good to end the scoring.

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Dick Duff Scores Two As Leafs Down Canucks 2-1

TORONTO. (CP)—Rookie Dick Duff, a 19-year-old left-winger scored two goals Wednesday night to pace Toronto Maple Leafs to a 2-1 victory over Montreal Canadiens before a sellout National Hockey League crowd of 13,852.

The Toronto victory, coupled with Detroit Red Wings' loss to New York Rangers, lifted the Maple Leafs out of the cellar and into fifth place ahead of Detroit. Canadiens remained in first place but now hold only a one-point margin over New York.

The first period was scoreless and centre Jackie Leclair opened the scoring for Canadiens at 3:37 of the second frame, driving home a 30-foot shot after linemate Dickie Moore's pass out from behind the Leaf net.

Duff evened the score at 16:25 with his first NHL goal, fooling Montreal netminder Jacques Plante from about three feet out.

It was the Leafs' fourth straight game at home without a loss. They have won three here and tied one but have a poor record on the road—five straight losses.

New York Rangers Humble Detroit Red Wings 6-2

NEW YORK. (CP)—New York Rangers scored their most lopsided victory over Detroit Red Wings in nearly three years Wednesday night as they drubbed the National Hockey League champions 6-2.

The Rangers scored four goals in the final period for their second straight victory over the Red Wings and the most one-sided since they defeated Detroit 8-2 Jan. 22, 1954 at Olympia. In all of last season, the Rangers took only two games from the champions.

With only seconds remaining, the Detroit captain, Ted Lindsay scored, tying the NHL goal-scoring record for leftwingers. Lindsay's 27th goal of his career matched the mark set by Aurel Joliat of Montreal Canadiens.

WORSLEY OUTSTANDING

Although the Rangers romped away in the third period, it was the second time in a week that their goalie, Lorne Worsley, was called on to make more than 40 saves. He stopped 46 Toronto shots last Wednesday in turning back the Leafs by an identical 6-2 score.

Ron Murphy, the NHL goal-scoring leader, paced the Ranger attack with his seventh and eighth goals of the year. Jack Evans, Dave Creighton, Andy Heberton and Dean Prentice got the others.

Earl Reibel got the other goal, giving the Wings a temporary 1-1 tie at the end of the first period. But the Rangers pulled ahead in the second frame as Evans drove in a shot while his own club was shorthanded after Dean Prentice stole the puck and outmanoeuvred two Red Wings.

A four-goal rally in the third period completed the rout.

The victory boosted the Rangers into undisputed possession of second place in the NHL standings, only a single point behind the league-leading Montreal Canadiens who lost 2-1 at Toronto.

Lew Hoad Signs Pro Contract

SYDNEY, Australia. (Reuters)—Australian Davis Cup star Lew Hoad has signed a tentative agreement with American tennis promoter Jack Kramer to turn professional, it was reported Wednesday night.

Hoad's father revealed the existence of the agreement after a hotel-room meeting with Kramer.

Because the brilliant athlete is under 21 and classified as a minor under Australian law, the agreement is not legally binding until it has the signature of Hoad's father and the approval of a district court.

However, it was suggested in some quarters that Hoad already had relinquished his amateur status because of the tentative contract.

Kramer said he would "discuss money offers tomorrow."

Hoad and playing-mate Ken Rosewall recently turned down reported \$50,000 offers from Kramer.

Three Canadians Hit The Jackpot In Sweepstakes

An octogenarian, an immigrant and a housewife hit the jackpot in the Irish sweepstakes Wednesday, each winning \$140,000 when Retrial came first in the Cambridgeshire Handicap Stakes at Newmarket, England.

Albert Stock, 83, English-born retired service station operator of Valois, a Montreal suburb, was so excited "he hardly knew what to say" when he heard the news.

So said his daughter, Mrs. Ernest Clark, who acted as spokesman.

Mrs. Stock is 85 and the couple celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary last July.

Kurt Grund, 26, night - shift worker at a Sudbury nickel mine, had to be awakened to be told he won \$140,000. Grund, native of Breslau, Germany who came to Canada only four years ago, broke down and sobbed, then said "thank God, but I don't believe it."

He asked a reporter to call his wife, a Sudbury domestic, and tell her to "come home right away."

"I'm too excited to speak even to her."

Grund said he hopes the money may help find a path to freedom for his mother, brother and sister now in East Germany. He also hopes to buy a house and "maybe after we get settled my wife and I can take a honeymoon. We never had one when we were married three years ago because we couldn't afford it."

The third first-prize winner was Mrs. Ginette Mainville of Montmagny, Que.

Mrs. B. K. Fallis of Lockport, Ont., held a ticket on Turk's Blood, which came second at Newmarket. Mrs. Fallis won \$56,000.

Bert Linton, Oshawa, Ont., held the sole Canadian ticket on Swept, third place horse, and he won \$28,000.

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
