Senator Haythorne's Illness.

OTTAWA, May 4.

Labor Demonstrations

In England and on the Continent.

Massacre of Laborers in Belgium.

LONDON, May 4.

The Hyde Park labor meeting yesterday was attended by three hundred thousand men who were addressed from twelve platforms. A resolution favoring a compulsory labor day of eight hours was passed.

Quiet generally prevailed in the continental cities yesterday. There were, however, demonstrations in the principal towns of Germany, Holland and Switzerland, and there was considerable rioting in the mining districts of Belgium. Last night's papers' despatches say the details of the labor troubles at Fourmies are immensely heightened in political importance by the fact that six women and eight men were killed on the spot, while twenty were wounded, several fatally. This gives the affair the character of a massacre. The soldiers were merely exposed to stone throwing, but they replied with successive volleys from their new letal rifles, inflicting frightful wounds on their victims. The horses exposed to the fire were ridden, and there is every sign that reckless and wanton inhumanity was shown by the troops. The local popular commotion is intense and it finds a response in the growing excitement in every working centre. Fourmies to-night is practically in state of siege. The tension of the public feeling may be judged from the fact that the military are hailed with cries of "Vive Prussia." The funeral of the victims was fixed for to-day, but the enormous number of workmen arriving from other industrial centres caused the government to send for reinforcements and to order the postponement of the funerals until to-morrow.
