Paul Martin Has Plea For Two-Party System

SYDNEY, N.S. (CP) — Liberal front-bencher Paul Martin said Saturday night the Progressive Conservative government in its attitude to British trade proposals first refused to put up, then returned to shut up. Speaking at a dinner here, the MP for Essex East said Prime Minister Diefenbaker, having rejected Britain's free-trade offer in 1957, then proceeded to complicate Britain's effort to enter the European Common Market in every possible way.
"This he did so successfully that Britain's entry now has been postponed perhaps indefinitely," Mr. Martin said.
"... This government having refused to put up, refused to shut up," he said.
Mr. Martin also sought to have Canadians shun the minority parties in favor of a return to the two-party system. He said:
"For years we enjoyed good and honest government, and consequently we came to the conclusion that the election of a majority government did not count for much."
"We came to the conclusion that we could enjoy the political luxury of voting for minority parties, parties which have no future."
"In any times we can afford minor parties but in times of domestic and international economic and political crisis, such as are these times, we can afford only two parties."

Bow Rudder Removed, Confederation Is Back

BORDEN — With her bow rudder removed and her bow and propellers modified, for improved operation in ice, the CNR's MV Confederation docked at Ice Borden pier shortly after 10:30 last night.
The Borden-Tormentine ferry, which works with the MV Abegweit and the SS Prince Edward Island, recently completed a thorough overhaul and modification program at the Halifax Shipyards Ltd.
The Confederation is reported to have left Halifax at about 4 p.m. Saturday and made good time on her run to Borden. She was met in the Strait of Canso area by the government ice-breaker John A. MacDonnell and it is said that she had little difficulty in following the ice-breaker through ice choked St. George's Bay and Northumberland Strait.
"This was a vast difference from her trip up from Halifax a year ago, following her acceptance for service. On that occasion despite the work of an ice-breaker, the Confederation found the going difficult, the ice was believed to be due to her lack of power and the bow rudder making her hard to handle in ice."
Railway officials were not available here last night to give any information as to when the Confederation may be put into service.

Damage Is Heavy In Two Collisions

SUMMERSIDE — One highway accident was investigated by Summerside RCMP over the weekend.
A two-car collision about 12:15 Saturday night a quarter-mile east of Read's Corner on the Trans-Canada highway caused an estimated \$450 damage to a 1961 model car driven by Percy Andrew MacNeill of Summerside, when its front end was in the rear of a 1962 model car driven by Joseph St. Clair Duffy of Kinkora. The Duffy car suffered about \$300 damage.
Both vehicles were proceeding in the same direction when the mishap occurred. Several passengers in both cars, in addition to the driver of the Duffy car, were uninjured. Ice roads and left the highway between Alma and Elmsdale, rolling over into the ditch.
The driver was not injured and the car sustained about \$400 damage.

Icy S'side Streets Cause Accidents

SUMMERSIDE — Two motor vehicle accidents in town were investigated by Summerside police yesterday.
The first occurred about 4:15 when a car was stopped waiting for the train to pass at the Water Street East crossing, and it was struck from behind by another car that failed to stop on icy streets. No serious damage was reported and no injuries resulted.
The second accident, also attributed to icy streets, occurred at 8:55 at the intersection of Granville and Pleasant Streets. No serious damages were incurred, and no injuries were reported.
