THE NEWS IN SHORT METRE.

Items of Interest Billed Down For More Easy Reading.
 The Bubonic plague now threatens all Northern India.
 Liverpool has voted \$22,000,000 for the further extension of its dock system. They don't stop at trifles there.
 They are now talking of running the Hon. Seth Low as the next Republican candidate for Governor of New York.
 Owing to the failure of the grain crop, there is a fodder famine in Russia, and the peasants are selling their cattle and horses for anything they can get.
 There is a possibility of the Montreal rolling mills moving to some Eastern Ontario town before long. Trenton is making a big bid for the works.
 The horses of the German cavalry regiments are to be shod entirely with paper shoes, recent experiments as to their durability having proved very satisfactory.

Mr. J. L. Larke, Dominion commercial agent in Australia, complains that his efforts to promote trade between the two countries are frequently rendered nugatory by the dilatoriness of Canadian forms.
 During the September quarter of the current year Canada's imports amounted to \$32,900,471, duties \$5,127,706, as compared with imports to the value of \$32,684,242 and duties \$5,216,788 for the corresponding quarter last year.
 Lt-Governor Mackintosh of the North-west territories was once an unsuccessful candidate in Russell county, Ontario. The other day he sent a contribution to the sufferers by the Russell fire, remarking that he had some recollection of having once been fired in the same place himself.

The Allan liner Pomeranian is ashore on the Isle of Arran and there are other vessels aground in the Firth or Clyde. Montreal will tender Glasgow full sympathy in her tribulations, mitigated by a certain sense of relief that this kind of trouble is not confined to the St. Lawrence.
 A despatch to the New York Herald from Havana says: Correspondence just received from the Herald's correspondent in Puerto Principe states that an opening of Spanish soldiers occurred there recently. The mutiny developed into a conflict in the streets between the commanding officers and the troops. The soldiers mutinied because the rations were insufficient and they could get no pay.


The Ottawa Free Press does not wonder at Montreal Irishmen resenting the caricatures that are put on as stage Irishmen, and recalls the fact that Hon. Mr. Anglin once eloquently denounced the insult to the Irish race so generally conveyed by American plays called Irish. Mr. Anglin's argument failed in stopping the cause of the grievance. Perhaps the egg and potato protest will be more effective. It is, at any rate, more in the line that the authors of the plays would be expected to understand.

There was a terrible uproar in the Queen's Theatre, Montreal, the other night when an Irish farce called "O'Hoolihan's Silver Wedding" was presented; The lithographs and wall pictures were considered objectionable by many of the Irish in the city and were daubed with pitch. Another crowd of indignant Irishmen were in the theatre. There was a good deal of disturbance, which came to a head in the third act, when the actors were pelted with rotten eggs and potatoes, and the performance was brought to an abrupt conclusion.

Germany is not supposed to class with some other countries as a maritime nation but Germany has the largest ship yard, and is the home of the company which owns the world's largest fleet. The Hamburg-American Company owns shipping with a net capacity of 174,990 tons. The London Peninsular and Oriental comes next with 164,836 tons, followed by the British India Company, another London concern, with 162,482. The North German Lloyds is next, a Marseilles house fifth, then an Italian company, another British firm, and a Japanese corporation. The Cunards have the fourteenth place. The three largest steamers afloat are owned by the Hamburg-American and North German Lloyds. The Cunarders Lucania and Campania follow.

An old farmer near Balmoral, knowing the Queen's partiality for collies, sent Her Majesty a brace of fine pups of an excellent breed. He was sent for to the castle, and, having been hastily coached as to what he was to say and do, he was introduced into the royal presence. Naturally, he forgot his lesson, and was all in confusion for the moment. But the Queen's gracious manner soon put him at his ease. Her Majesty shook hands with him, and said: "I have to thank you for those two beautiful collies you sent me." And to this gracious remark the farmer replied: "Touts, touts, wumman! haud yer tongue. What's the matter o' a pair o' dowgs between you and me."

QUICK JOURNEY TO INDIA.—The journey from London to Bombay now occupies, by the quickest route, somewhere about seven ten days. Sixty years ago the East India Company voted the sum of £25,000 for an elaborate survey of the Euphrates Valley, and in 1872 a committee of the House of Commons recommended the construction of a railway from the Mediterranean Sea to the head of the Persian Gulf. But nothing more was done. Now the occupation of Egypt by the British affords additional facilities for such an undertaking and it is likely that the work will be soon entered upon.
