'In Concert' Performance Proves Maritime Entertainment Quality

Catherine McKinnon bade "Farewell To Nova Scotia" and was accepted immediately into the hearts of the hundreds of Islanders who crammed into Confederation Centre Theatre Saturday night to hear the talented miss "in concert".

Supported by her sister Patricia, Brian Ahern, Don Burke and Athan Katsos, Miss McKinnon definitely disproved the old belief that top-notch entertainment comes only from Upper Canada or the States. All currently living in Halifax, the members of this quintet demonstrated Saturday night they are on their way to stardom, each in his own right.

Despite the fact that Saturday's performance was allowed to drag at times, it ended all too soon—just as the audience began to warm to some of the more rousing numbers. And considering it was the first time this group has worked together in a program of this nature, on a theatre stage before a sell-out house, the performance was a worthwhile effort and few if any went away disappointed.

Catherine's performance was excellent as expected. The program was built around her vocal skill and she came through with flying colors singing many of the familiar songs from her album. She gave the people exactly what they wanted, that same clear, perfectly-controlled voice which has made her recordings so popular.

UNEXPECTED PLEASURE

The big surprise, however was the younger Miss McKinnon, Patricia. This girl can sing! Patricia is perhaps best known for her TV appearances on "Frank's Bandstand" which, sadly, seldom gives her talent an opportunity to show forth. But Saturday night she displayed a fine sound and style which reminds one somewhat of Judy Collins.

A member of TV's "Singsong Jubilee" gang, as are all the others, Don Burke is best known to us through his banjo-picking skill and as leader of The Don Burke Four. But considering he was a late addition to the "in concert" program his contribution more than justified his inclusion. Don sings, plays the guitar as well as the banjo, and projects a sense of humor with the impromptu innocence of the proverbial country boy.

Brian Ahern (guitar) and Athan Katsos (bass) primarily served as the accompanists, but provided additional wit and entertainment with displays of their instrumental prowess. Mr. Ahern seemed much more at ease with the non-electric guitar as an accompanist than as a soloist on the electric.

The program was divided into two sections. The first was more formal, from dress to song styles. A good deal of the formality was lost, however, when at the very beginning Catherine was forced to struggle with a too-high microphone until Patricia came to her rescue.

A HIGHLIGHT

Although the songs in this part were mostly from the McKinnon sisters' records and therefore soft moving ballads for the most part, more perfect selections could not have been made to emphasize the girls' voices. Patricia sang a hauntingly beautiful ballad of a log jam and lost love. This was perhaps the highlight of the first half, but the reason may have been only that it was not one of the familiar recordings.

Mr. Burke's version of "Old Blue (not the one you're thinking of) provided both humor and banjo skill, while Mr. Ahern played an interesting composition of his own called "Conversation".

In the second half of the group appeared in much more relaxed attire and the pattern of the program from then on followed the same trend. However, informality can be overdone, and at times it almost got out of hand. The impression was that the between-song patter had not been prepared at all and the program was a let's-hope-for-the-best affair. The informality did, however, let the personalities shine through as they really are, showing that these are just normal young people, but with a lot of talent.

The numbers in the second half were of the popular and up-tempo type with selections such as "Autumn Leaves" by Mr. Ahern, looking more like a beachcomer than an instrument-
