THE DAIRY INDUSTRY.

The congregation of loaded sleighs and horses around the Central Creamery in these latter days of March reminds one of the old times, before the settlement of the prairies, when potatoes would occasionally be as high as "eighteen pence a bushel," or oats up to "two and six."

The demand for butter has been good this spring, and our farmers are, as usual, ready to respond to the demand. The price obtained for creamery made butter will not net our farmers almost, if not quite, as much as in the old days when the labor and care of butter making fell wholly upon the gentle laboring housewife.

In this connection, our readers will be glad to learn that the Dominion Government will continue to superintend the manufacture of butter and cheese in this Province. Indeed, we learn that the Government has decided to send here another competent cheese maker to assist Mr. Dillon in the superintendence of the cheese factories, to the end that there may be produced in the Island Province a perfectly uniform as well as a high quality of cheese.

There is no objection—so we are informed—to the Government giving all the help, instruction and oversight that is required, and this will be continued as long as may be necessary. But strong objection has been taken to the Government offering financial assistance or taking risk in the selling of the cheese. It is contended in Montreal and other places that the action of the Government last year, in holding P. E. Island cheese, had a bad effect upon prices.

Any difficulty resulting from this decision of the Government will vanish as soon as we have cold storage; and it only remains to push on as rapidly as possible the construction of the needed cold storage warehouses. We learn that Professor Robertson is confident that the working of the factories will be as satisfactory this year as last, and that there will be little, if any loss consequent upon the withdrawal of the Government from the commercial part of the business.

THE GOVERNOR'S SPEECH.

That cold storage is required forthwith, that additional room is needed at the Hospital for the Insane, that a Poor House ought to be built on the Government Farm and the poor people in it given an opportunity to work and assist in their maintenance—all this may be admitted. But in what position is this Province to enter upon the construction of these important and expensive works?

the years after the lamentable contest in which corruption and boodle spread, like a pestilence throughout the land? We say that they could. How different to-day would have been the position of this Province if the resources of the Public Lands Office had been conserved and the debentures had not been issued? When Mr. Peters introduced his Debenture Bill the amount actually due the banks was about \$50,000, and the Province owed no permanent debt whatever.

SIR DONALD'S TESTIMONY. One of the most important speeches in the debate on the Remedial Bill was that of Sir Donald Smith. As the Montreal Gazette remarks, it was more than a speech; it was a statement made by a plenipotentiary as to how he had fulfilled a mission on which he had been sent, what he had intended when he completed his negotiations, and how he understood that the other parties to the compact had intended to agree to.

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RECORDS OF P. E. ISLAND.

We submit the following additional quotations from Mr. Brynner's report on Canadian archives:

1773. November 9—"Powell to Desbrisay. The King has ordered the discontinuance of advertisements to encourage emigration from Great Britain to St. John's Island."

1773. November 22—"Desbrisay to Powell. It is concerned that his advertisement for tenants for his lands in the island of St. John should have given office; had never taken a tenant from the north of Ireland without the consent of the proprietor, or agent, of the lands. Has now withdrawn his advertisement."

1773. November 26—"Secretary of State (Dartmouth) to Caulfield. If he does not repair to his charge in Charlottetown, an assistant clerkman shall be appointed and paid the full salary."

1773. December 1—"Secretary of State (Dartmouth) to Patterson. His satisfaction at a complete legislature being constituted for St. John's Island, being no material objection to the plan for a meeting of the proprietors and enclosure note from Lord Herford's agent in proof of this."

1774. January 8—"Secretary of State (Dartmouth) to Patterson. Has referred Acts of the Legislature to the Board of Trade; shall also transmit report of the distressed state of the officials in consequence of the failure of the fund in which payment of their salaries depends."

1774. January 20—"Prayer of the proprietors of St. John's Island. That an extension of time be given for the payment of the second half of the quit rent, in consideration of paying the one half from 1st of May, 1769, instead of 1st of March, five years after the grants were made, and of the island being constituted a separate government. A list is attached of the proprietors, with the amounts paid, and those remaining due on the 1st of May, 1774."
