## Zatopek Thinks Got Good Chance

VIENNA (AP) — Czechoslovakia's track ace Emil Zatopek says he believes he stands a "good chance" for a gold medal in the marathon of the 1956 Olympic Games at Melbourne, Australia, Radio Prague announced Wednesday.

Zatopek added that he also wishes to run in the 10,000-metre race but has little hope winning it.

In the 1952 Olympics in Helsinki, Zatopek won gold medals in the 5,000-metre, 10,000-metre and marathon races.

## British Cricketers Scolded Following Umpire Kidnapping

LONDON (Reuters) — Britain's touring cricketers are getting a vigorous scolding in London newspapers following the "kidnapping" of a Pakistani umpire by a number of team members at Peshawar last Sunday.

Eight players, reported in disagreement with some of Idris Beg's decisions during the current series of unofficial test matches between the two countries, donned handkerchief masks and seized the umpire, taking him to their hotel room, British newspapers said.

Correspondents said Beg told them the cricketers "gagged me,

twisted my arm and held me down" and later let him go after dousing him with water. The reporters said Beg was wearing his arm in a sling as a result of the incident.

Team manager Geoffrey Howard has since apologized to the umpire.

The Daily Herald says of the incident: "Such behavior, particularly toward an umpire whose decisions have not met with the approval of the Englishmen, will need a great deal of explaining."

## Queen, Mother, And Princess To See Race

LONDON (AP) — Queen Elizabeth, Queen Mother Elizabeth and Princess Margaret will join half a million other horse racing fans at Aintree March 24 for the Grand National Steeplechase.

They will be rooting for Devon Loch and m'As-Tu-Vu, owned by the Queen Mother.

Only previous royal victory in the 120-year-old National was in 1900 when Ambush, a 4-1 shot, owned by the then Prince of Wales, won the gruelling four miles, 856 yards chase over 30 jumps.

Devon Loch is a 20-1 shot in the betting. m'As-Tu-Vu is not quoted in present lists which make last year's winner, Quare Times, 6-1 favorite.

## Picture Grim In Canada's Junior Football Leagues

TORONTO (CP)—Football legislators are scheduled to give serious consideration this week to the sad financial state of the country's junior leagues, the grass roots of Canadian football. The picture is grim.

Western Canada unions are broke. In the east, the situation is almost as tough. All sectional 1955 playoff games showed a deficit, topped by a loss of \$2,899 in the Canadian final at Winnipeg between Windsor AKO and Winnipeg Bods. Total deficit of all playoff games was \$4,205.

The junior committee of the Canadian Rugby Union will make a big pitch for increased financial aid from the CRU, the Western In-

terprovincial Football Union and the Big Four at a closed session of the CRU executive Friday. The Juniors figure they have a good talking point.

They have completed a survey showing that 150 graduates of junior ranks were on the rosters of the nine WIFU and Big Four clubs in 1955. Some were freshmen in professional company but many joined the senior clubs in recent years and were good enough to stay in the big time.

**WEST IS CHOICE**

The survey shows also that the west is the choice spawning ground of junior talent. Seventy-five of the 150 players were products of the junior branch of the WIFU. Big Four rosters had 30 graduates from leagues affiliated with the union. Included in the list are Edmonton Eskimos' Normie Kwong, noted the country's outstanding native Canadian player in 1955 and teammates Don Barry and Oscar Kruger.

The juniors, who receive between \$6,000 and \$9,000 annually from the CRU and other grants

from the WIFU and Big Four, are anxious for increased payments for another reason. The committee is backing an application by the Maritime Football Union to affiliate with the CRU.

Satterfield nailed Carter twice with vicious left hooks to the head in the ninth and 10th rounds but Carter fought back each time.
