WIND STORM LAST NIGHT

Trees Blown Down and Other Damage

BRIDGE AT ST. PETER'S BAY REPORTED DAMAGED

Similar Report Regarding the Ferry Wharf at Georgetown.

The storm of last night may be described as a "howling success." The wind began to get boisterous about half-past eight, and continued to increase in violence. The average velocity of the wind was 36 miles an hour, but at times it scampered along at the rate of 45 miles. The wind was south, veering northwest to north. The fury of the storm was spent about six o'clock this morning. There was only a slight fall of rain.
 About Charlottetown houses were shaken by the wind and loose shingles lifted from the roofs. Trees were blown down, and telephone, electric light and fire alarm wires demoralized.
 The chimney of a house near Hillsborough Square was blown down during the storm, falling upon the roof and crashing through into a bedroom sending the plaster and other debris upon the occupants of the room.
 It is thought that the damage to fruit in orchards that were exposed will be very great. The corn crop must also have suffered greatly. But it is believed that the grain will not be materially affected.
 The bridge and wharf at St Peter's Bay are reported to have been damaged.
 The ferry wharf at Georgetown is also reported damaged.
 A box car was blown off the track at Hunter River.

DUNCAN McLEOD IS DEAD.

Well-Known Mining Broker Has Passed Away.

"The Twice A Week Spokesman's Review," of Spokane, Washington Territory, contains the following:
 "Duncan McIntyre McLeod died Monday at 1 o'clock at his home, corner of Cedar and Sixth. The funeral will take place from the residence at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Rev. G. William Giboney will officiate.
 Mr. McLeod was born November 23, 1850, at New London, P. E. Island. He went to San Francisco in 1879, and removed to the Dalles, Or., in 1881. He has been a resident of Spokane since 1889. While in the Dalles he was a business partner of George Motdy, of Oregon for eight years. In Spokane he was engaged in business as a merchant until after the fire, when he became a real estate and mining broker. He leaves a wife and three daughters, all residents of this city. His mother and brothers George and Andrew reside at New London. Another brother lives at Breckton, Mass, and another, Lemuel, at Riverside, Cal. He leaves two sisters, Mrs McNeill of Cavendish, P. E. I., and Miss Catherine McLeod of Boston, Mass.
 "Mr McLeod was an elder in the First Presbyterian church and prominent in religious circles. He has been in feeble health for three years. He contracted a cold which developed into lung trouble, which proved fatal."
