MONDAY

Premier J. Walter Jones herd of Holstein cattle were acclaimed to be equal to or better than any cattle herd in England by seven British Agricultural Scientists who arrived here yesterday morning for a 48 hour visit to the Province.

Headed by Sir William Ogg, director of the Rothamsted Experimental Station in England, the group visited Premier Jones farm yesterday afternoon. They were particularly impressed with the high butter fat test of the herd which prompted Mr. J. H. Anderson to state that he had never heard of a herd test quite so high.

A near tragedy was averted on Friday afternoon at about 4:15 p.m. by quick thinking and action. Master Dennis Martell, five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William S. Martell, accidentally fell off his father's wharf when he wandered out of sight of his parents.

Neither parent could swim but their cries brought a number of young men quickly to the scene and Harold MacLean dove in and brought the little lad to the surface. Arthur MacSwain skillfully applied artificial respiration and to consciousness. He was then relieved by Cullen DeLory.

The boy was moved to a near-by house and Dr. Kennedy was called. Later on Friday evening the little lad had recovered sufficiently from his experience to be moved to his home in near-by Burnt Point.

Mr. A. L. MacDonald, known to many radio listeners of past years as the "Friendly Voice", died at the Provincial Sanatorium yesterday at the age of 47.

A graduate of St. Dunstan's University, the late Mr. MacDonald was on the staff of Radio Station CFXY from 1935 to 1945 as program director. During this time he did much to improve the services offered by this station.

Forced to leave his position there due to ill health, Mr. MacDonald had been a patient at the Sanatorium off and on for the past five years.

He was a son of the late Allan L. MacDonald and Elizabeth MacQuaid of Souris, and is survived by his wife and two sons. These latter reside at the Souris home of the late Mr. Arthur McQuaid, who was his uncle. Funerals will be held in Souris on Wednesday morning.

COLEBROOKE, County Fermanagh, Northern Ireland, July 10 (Reuters)—Sir Basil Brooke, Prime Minister of Northern Ireland, today entertained two agricultural experts from Canada's Maritime Provinces at his model farm here.

Taylor said later: "We are most impressed with the progress of agriculture in Ulster. Sir Basil Brooke's farm has many interesting features, notably its grass-conservation plant."

Air Cadets—350 strong—from many parts of the Maritimes and Newfoundland arrived at the R. C. A. F. training station at Summerside yesterday to start two weeks' training. They are the first of three groups that will receive instructions here during the summer.

Cadets arriving today were from Dartmouth, Truro, Windsor, New Waterford, Kentville, in Nova Scotia; Moncton and Fredericton in New Brunswick; Corner Brook and St. John's in Newfoundland, as well as a group from Summerside.

During the next two weeks the Air Cadets will learn to construct a one-tube radio transmitter. Each of the 31 Air Cadet Squadrons in the Maritimes will have its own operative radio receiver soon and will learn the basic principles of radio. The cadets will also spend 1-2 hours in the air on familiarization flights while at the Summerside base. Commanding the camp is Sqdn. Ldr. E. Feener of Liverpool, N.S.

The highlight of the largely attended opening day of the 37th Annual Convention of the Prince Edward Island Women's Institutes, held yesterday at the Prince of Wales College, was the stirring and inspirational address given during the evening session by Mrs. E. E. Morton, Vegreville, Alta., President of the Federated Women's Institutes in Canada.

Choosing as her subject "The Institute Movement in Canada", Mrs. Morton held the huge crowd from the moment she stepped to the microphone. Her sincerity and her love of neighbor and country

were brought out to everyone in the auditorium as she told of the work of the Institute movement since its organization in 1897 by Mrs. A. Hoodless of Ontario.

Mrs. Morton told how, after losing her child because of ignorance as to the correct foods necessary, Mrs. Hoodless undertook the terrific job of organizing a women's group that would teach women the knowledge essential to the health and happiness of their families. The farmers had the Farmers' Institutes, and Mrs. Hoodless set about organizing the Women's Institutes. Mr. Morton took the audience back over the years as she told of the spreading of the movement into the Western Provinces, to Wales in 1915, and through Europe in 1930.

"Peace begins with each of you", she concluded. "We must each stretch out our hand, not stretch it down, to help our neighbors."

Mrs. Malcolm MacLeod, Lorne Valley, President of the P.E.I.W.I. presided at the morning session, and in her presidential report Mrs. MacLeod commented on the excellent work done by the various groups throughout the Province in making the year one of progress and achievement.

Provincial Life Memberships were awarded to four members during the evening session. These pins are given to members by their local institutes in tribute to more than twenty years of service "For Home and Country". Life memberships were presented by Mrs. Malcolm MacLeod to each of the following: Mrs. E. S. Rose, East Baltic, Mrs. W. W. Crosby, Meadowbank, Mrs. Harrison MacFarlane, Beedee, and Mrs. T. G. Ives, formerly of Montserrat. Citations were read, and corsages presented by the following: Mrs. R. L. Burge, Mrs. Alan Stewart, Mrs. M. MacGowan, and Mrs. J. Herring. Each of the ladies honored spoke a few words of appreciation.

The dwelling house of Mr. Howard Walte, Loyalist, and nearly all its furniture were destroyed yesterday afternoon by a flash fire which broke out around two o'clock.

In a resolution passed at the recent annual meeting in O'Leary of the West Prince Liberal Association, the County representative in the House of Commons, Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, was requested to "submit and recommend" to Prime Minister St. Laurent the appointment of Premier J. Walter Jones to the vacancy in the Senate created by the death of Hon. John E. Sinclair.

In the event of Premier Jones not desiring to have his name submitted, the resolution asked that Mr. MacNaught "submit and recommend for said vacancy the name of a resident of Prince County, said County now being without representation in the Senate of Canada."

It was resolved that a copy of this resolution be submitted forthwith to the Prime Minister, together with a letter signed by the president and secretary of the Association, emphasizing the wishes of the meeting.

In another resolution, the meeting favoured the appointment of war veterans to office instead of civilians "when all conditions are equal as to ability, finances, etc."

Where the question of an appointment between a veteran and a civilian arises, the resolution stated that both parties "have a right to a hearing before the head of the Department and an impartial board or commission," said commission to consist of five members serving without remuneration but with expenses paid by the Department, and to include a representative of the Canadian Legion.
