

New Regulations Announced For Federal Civil Servants

OTTAWA (CP)—New regulations effective Monday will give civil servants four weeks annual holidays after 20 years employment, but dock their pay for being late for work.

The regulations were made public Wednesday by Sam Hughes, chairman of the Civil Service Commission which recommended them to the cabinet. They were passed Monday and are to be effective April 1, when the new Civil Service Act becomes law.

In the past, all civil servants were given three weeks annual leave after one year of service. However, after 25 years in the government's employ, a civil servant could claim one extra furlough leave of five weeks.

Civil servants will lose half an hour's pay for every half hour they are late for work or

take off before the end of their normal working day. To meet normal traffic hazards and other contingencies, they will not be penalized if the latenesses do not occur more frequently than twice a month or 12 times a year.

Another main feature of the new regulations is to make pay rates available immediately where they apply to civil servant might go for a year after being promoted before getting a higher rate of pay.

Regulations have been simplified governing "moon-lighting," taking part-time employment in off hours. Under the new rules, civil servants may take second jobs as long as they do not unduly exploit their fellow employees for personal gain, take jobs which conflict with their civil service duties, or make unauthorized use of government equipment or information they acquire as civil servants.

Speaker Kills Member's Bill

OTTAWA (CP)—Speaker Roland Michener has ordered that the private bill of W. L. M. Creighton (PC—Westmorland) not be proceeded with on the ground that it is a money bill. Only the government can introduce bills involving expenditure of public funds.

Mr. Creighton attempted to introduce in the Commons a bill to amend the Public Service Pension Adjustment Act to make sure, he said, that 4,013 retired CNR workers in New Brunswick continue to receive their pensions.

Mr. Creighton said he understood when the Adjustment Act was passed in 1959 that the railway pensioners were included. However, the treasury board, a cabinet committee, had since ruled that they were not included.

Opposition Leader Pearson and H. J. Robichaud (L—Gloucester) said the matter was one for the government to deal with and it should introduce the bill.

Speaker Michener ordered the bill to stand until it could be further examined and his decision made final. As a result, Mr. Creighton was not permitted to introduce the bill at this time.

Aid Increased To Immigrants

OTTAWA (CP)—The government is increasing its special allowances to the children of immigrants, Immigration Minister Fairclough announced in the Commons Thursday.

The rates will be brought into line with the family allowances paid to all children—56 a month up to the age of 10, and \$8 a month for children 10 to 16.

Children of immigrants don't qualify for family allowances until they have been in Canada for one year, hence the special allowances. The new scale will go into effect April 1.

150 DIE OF SMALLPOX

BRUSSELS (Reuters)—A total of 150 persons have died of smallpox in Leopoldville since last October, Congolese Health Minister Gregoire Kamanga announced Wednesday. He said there have been about 600 cases of the disease and that 40 medical teams were carrying out a mass vaccination campaign in the Congolese capital.
