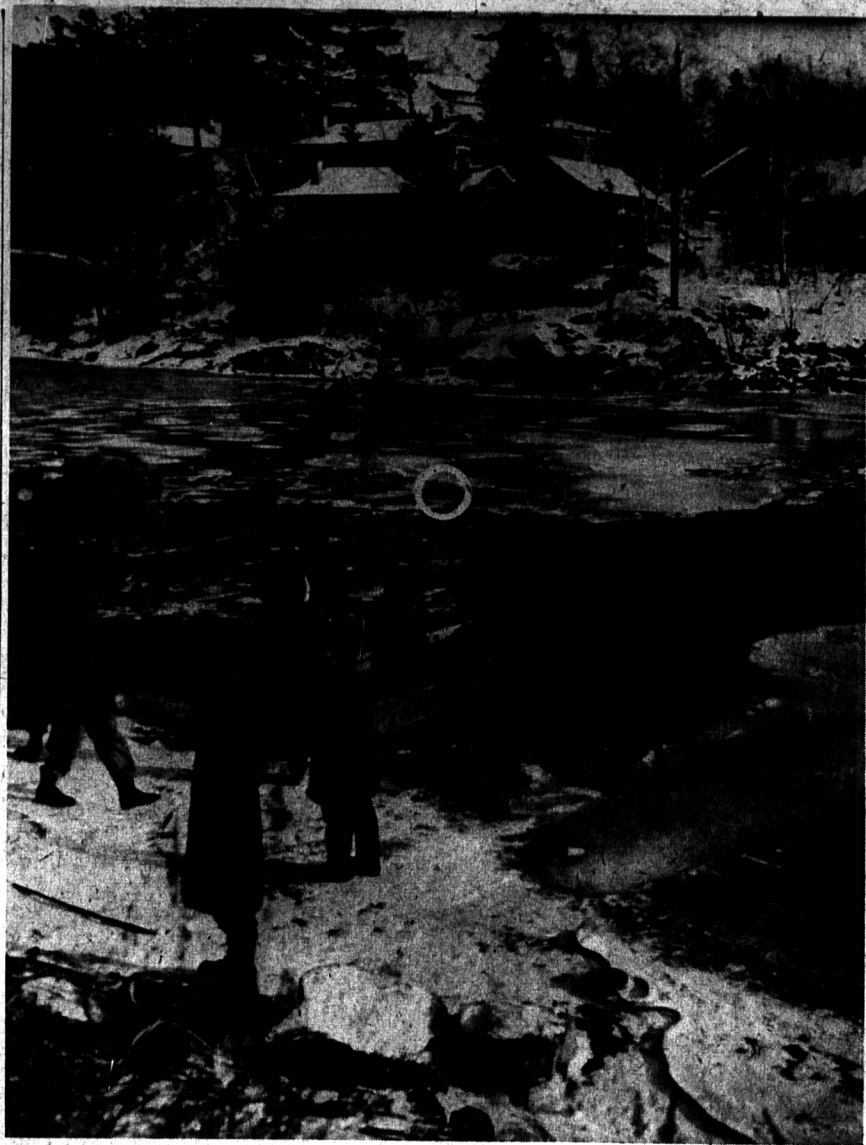
Miss Ada McDonald of Union Commercial College, Ch'town, is at present visiting her home in Dundas.

**Way Cleared For Saxton, Basilio Title Go In April**

NEW YORK (AP) — Former welterweight champion Kid Gavilan cleared the way Wednesday for a Johnny Saxton - Carmen Basilio title bout in Syracuse April 1, by withdrawing his claims for an immediate rematch with Saxton.

Saxton, who won the title from Gavilan in Philadelphia last October, and Basilio, the No. 1 contender, are expected to sign for the fight within a day or so.

Upon receipt of Gavilan's withdrawal—in writing — Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, promised Gavilan a match with the Saxton - Basilio winner within 45 days of the Syracuse scrap.

Gavilan also was assured of a Feb. 23 date at Miami — possibly against Sugar Ray Robinson, ex-welterweight and middleweight king. Robinson holds two victories over the Cuban.

Gavilan said he would be managed in the future by Famiel Chade, superintendent of a Havana bank.

Chade has been reported making

final arrangements to buy Gavilan's contract from Angel Lopez. A condition is that Lopez receive a small percentage of Gavilan's ring earnings until 1957.

**Weather Records During Last Year**

Mr. Warren A. Burns, of the Meteorological Station at the Experimental Farm, reporting on the weather records for 1954 said that generally speaking the winter was milder and the summer cooler than average. The lowest temperature was in February when it dropped to ten below zero and in January when the mercury registered seven below. The maximum temperature in January was 43 and in February 49. Shifting over to the warmer months, Mr. Burns said that the warmest day was in June when the thermometer ran up to 84 with August checking off at 81 and July reading 80. The November high reading was 62 and low 21, with December showing a high of 52 and a low of 15.

The heaviest rainfall was in July when 4.50 inches was recorded and the lowest in March with a reading of .91 inches. The January snowfall amounted to 45.0 inches, February 15.5 inches and March 28.0 inches. The November reading on snow was 10.0 inches and 20.5 in December.

Bright sunshine hours readings for the year were: Jan. 70.4, Feb. 66.0, March 136.4, April 208.9, May 184.0, June 210.2, July 206.8, Aug. 199.5, Sept. 181.8, Oct. 102.0, Nov. 51.3, Dec. 43.7. Total bright sunshine hours 1650.0.
