A War Flurry in Wheat.

THE PROSPECT OF HOSTILITIES SENDS PRICES BOOMING ON THE EXCHANGES.

There was a wild scene around the wheat pit on the Produce Exchange when the market opened for the day on the 10th inst. The war news seemed to have turned all the bears into bulls of the most rampant sort.

It is years since there has been such a day of excitement and heavy trading on the Produce Exchange. What was the great feature, of course, being the great food staple which the English and Russians will have to buy from this country if they fall to cutting one another's throats.

The favorite speculative fancy was No. 2 red wheat for May delivery. These options, which closed on Wednesday night at 93c per bushel, opened on the 10th inst., at 96c, then, as quick as the sales could be made, advanced to \$1.00.

Half an hour after the market opened there was a momentary reaction and the price went back to 97c. It soon recovered again under renewed purchases to 99c, at which price May wheat closed late in the day, after the market had had several ups and downs.

Aside from wheat, the market for other grain was active and excited, but to a less extent of course. Corn advanced 2c and 2 1/2c per bushel, and oats 1 1/2c. There was a large legitimate buying of corn for export.

When the gong sounded and the day's business was over, and the adjoining saloons were filled with thirsty and feverish men, the hoarse and fagged out brokers congratulated each other that, notwithstanding the stress of

the day, there had not been a single failure reported on the Exchange. But there was a great deal of nervousness, and the developments of the morrow were awaited with anxiety.

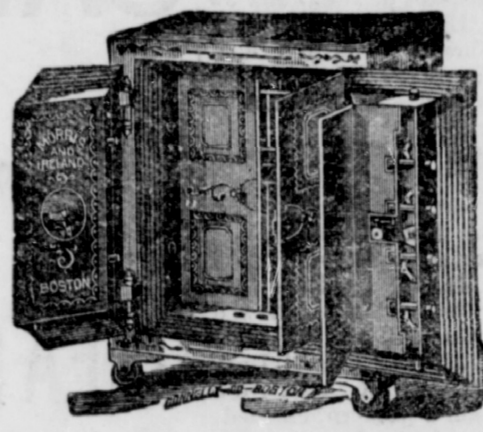
