Scholarships Offered For Training As Hospital Housekeeper

The American Hospital Association today announced the establishment of the Pacific Mills Hospital Education Fund to encourage technical training of personnel as hospital housekeepers.

Designed to help place the new profession of hospital housekeeper on a career basis for women with executive ability, the Pacific Mills Fund will provide ten full scholarships for the first formal educational course in hospital housekeeping, which has been established by the American Hospital Association at Michigan State College.

The eight-week course, which starts April 3, will be taught by members of the Michigan State College faculty, American Hospital Association staff specialists and other experts. It covers budget and record keeping, personnel management, job analysis, supplies and equipment, linen, furnishings, bacteriology, fire prevention and employee training methods, field trips, laboratory work and assigned reading supplement classroom lectures.

Commenting on the establishment of the Fund, Henry M. Elias, president of Pacific Mills, one of the nation's largest manufacturers of textiles, stated:

"In the last several years, new management systems, new techniques and new housekeeping aids have made hospital housekeeping an important and responsible occupation. In recognition of this, and as a further contribution toward better hospital care, our company has decided to support the pioneering work at Michigan State College by setting up, through the American Hospital Association, this scholarship fund. It will provide 10

full scholarships this year, paying for tuition and room and board on the campus."

Any qualified employee of a hospital which is a member of the American Hospital Association or any administrator of a member hospital with a qualified candidate may make application for a scholarship. Applications will be received until March 20 by the Pacific Mills Hospital Education Fund, American Hospital Association, 18 East Division Street, Chicago. Winners will be notified not later than March 27.
