Christmas Rush At Summerside P.O. Approaching

Although the Christmas rush at the Summerside Post Office has not reached its peak as yet, deadlines for mailing to distant points are being reached almost daily, with December 8th the deadline for United States mail and December 10th, for British Columbia mail.

The Overseas deadline is passed and Postmaster Charles Peters stated that there was an increase this year in overseas parcels through the local Post Office. Mr. Peters said the Post Office Department is well organized to handle the heavy Christmas mail and will have approximately 10 extra employees, who will probably start to work this weekend, the regular staff is now working 10 hours daily, six days a week and will continue to do so throughout the Christmas season. There is also a night staff of three employees as the train from the mainland, due in Summerside at 8:15 is usually very late and carries heavy mails.

Stamp sales have been increasing daily and the public is advised to get these stamps as soon as possible, making it easier for both the customer and the post office employees. Two tickets are now in use for selling stamps.

IN BUNDLES Those who have a large number of cards to mail can facilitate easier handling and faster delivery by tying them in bundles. This is because there is no drop at the Summerside Post Office for two cent cards, which go as third class mail, and consequently these get mixed in with the first class mail, resulting in slower handling and a larger backlog.

The deadline for cards mailed in Summerside to Summerside residents is December 17th, and with Sunday falling just two days before Christmas which means the Post Office is closed that day as usual, delivery time is cut down by one day, so the public is reminded to mail early.

Mr. Peters said his department will do everything possible, within regulations, to assist the public in expediting delivery during the Christmas rush.
