MONCTON TO GO

We are delighted to learn that Moncton will have harness racing again this season. This announcement was made by Frank Ryder, Moncton, secretary-treasurer of the Moncton Raceway, which is owned by a three-man group headed by Walter Cluff, Woodstock, N.B.

Mr. Ryder said that a well-known Moncton man would manage the track. Racing is expected to get underway on or about the 1st.

Saint John's Exhibition Park will open the season's racing on Sunday night, which, according to race secretary Fred Cery, is the earliest in the history of the Sackville track. Last year the season opened on May 31st.

There will be no afternoon racing. All the events will be staged at night, and it is expected that the purses will be higher than last year when \$107,350 was paid out. At present there are 138 horses at Exhibition Park and among them are a lot of newcomers. Here is a partial list:

# Canadian Fans Won't See Moore-Durelle Bout On TV

MONTREAL (CP) — Jack Kearns made a pitch Friday for a "double-title" classification for the Archie Moore-Yvon Durelle fight here next July 15 and lost.

The Montreal Athletic Commission told the veteran manager of veteran Archie that it doesn't want to mess around with a new classification — "junior heavyweight" — and that the fight for the world light-heavyweight title will stay that way.

Outside of Kearns' kickoff of the ballyhoo for the return engagement of Moore and the Canadian light-heavyweight champion, promoter Eddie Quinn had a few pertinent facts.

The bout will be held in Montreal Forum, said Quinn, and not the baseball park of the International League Montreal Royals. Scale of prices will be \$5 to \$25 with a potential maximum of \$277,000. Fight crowd capacity in the Forum is 15,800.

NO CANADIAN TV

There will be no Canadian television. Three American stations near the Canada-U.S. border will be blacked out. They are at Plattsburgh, N.Y., Burlington, Vt. and Poland Springs, the Mount Washington station, in Maine. There will be no radio broadcast.

Quinn said the fight might bring in \$50,000 more if held in the ball park but by the time this amount was "broken into pieces and everybody got his," the outdoor show didn't seem worthwhile. Besides, there were the U.S. television commitments — and the weather.

Quinn said "we're better off without Canadian TV if the CBC offered us \$50,000." He figures that for a fight of this calibre 2,000 or so more seats, as an off-setter, could be sold outside the metropolitan area.

Both fighters are expected here about three weeks before the scrap. The exact target date for Durelle, the Bale St. Anne, N.B., fisherman, is June 24. In their sensational meeting in the Forum last December Moore won by a knockout in the 11th round.

After the meeting with the contender for the heavyweight title. Commission Chairman Leopold Pigeon announced the thumb-down decision.
