

# Junior Abbies Edge MCA 6-5 In Fast League Game

The Junior Abbies pushed two runs across the plate in the last of the eighth inning and then scored the winner in the last of the ninth as they edged M.C.A. 6-5 on Memorial Field last night in a game played to decide the holder of fourth place in the Island Baseball League standings.

The teams finished the regular League schedule tied for fourth place with 16 points each, thus forcing last night's game.

However, the game was played under protest by M.C.A. The Juniors used Billy Purcell, who played with M.C.A. throughout most of the League schedule and the game was protested on the grounds that Purcell was ineligible to play with the Abbies.

Benny Carson again donned the hero's mantle for the Juniors as he singled home Cliff Ready from second base in the last of the ninth inning with the winning run.

Only minutes before Carson prevented an M.C.A. runner from scoring as he threw out Irving MacKinnon at the plate after MacKinnon attempted to race home from second on Paul Jay's single into left field.

Carson's leave from the outfield bounced in front of the plate and catcher Forbes Kennedy put the tag on MacKinnon to retire the side. Forbes then threw the field line after two men were out.

Cliff Ready led off the Abbies half of the ninth with a single into centerfield, his second hit of the game. He went to second on Don MacLeod's infield out and then came home as Carson belted MacLeod's first pitch into centerfield. For the Juniors it was an uphill battle all the way. They went into

the last of the eighth trailing 5-3 but scored two runs on singles by Hood, Dave MacLeod and Forbes Kennedy along with a three base outfield error.

M.C.A. went into an early lead and were ahead 5-2 at the end of the fourth. They were paced by shortstop Paul Jay who collected four hits in five trips. One of Jay's hits was a two-run homer in the fifth inning as he poked an Ian Kennedy pitch over the right field fence for the only four-master of the game.

Ian Kennedy pitched for the Abbies and gave up ten hits while striking out five and walking a like number. Lefty MacAleer hurled for M.C.A. and also gave up ten hits, struck out six and walked two.
