THE OPINION OF THE PRESS.

The St. John Sun (Conservative) in discussing the situation in Prince Edward Island thus editorially speaks of the Canadian Packing Company:—The business men of Charlottetown are sternly critical of the meat packing contract which the provincial government has just made. Prince Edward Island has already a considerable business in producing bacon, packing and preparing meat. Private persons who have built up important trades and industries are rather startled to find that the Government has passed them all by and made a large arrangement with outside promoters claiming to represent millionaires closely connected with the Armour's of Chicago. In spite of their great wealth these strangers are to receive a provincial guarantee of four per cent interest on \$150,000 of bonds. This means that the province is furnishing the capital for the new company to compete with local men providing their own capital. The Armour's and other members of the beef combine in the United States are not at this moment very popular at home. Even on Prince Edward Island, where persons "closely connected with the Armour's" appear as borrowers on the credit of the little province, the members of the board of trade appear to think that the government might as well back some Canadian who is in the meat business. Such an opportunity was afforded, for a firm which is already in the business offered to start local operations on a large scale. The weak point with the Canadian investors was that they did not want a guarantee on their bonds. They were willing to furnish their own money. The guarantee they asked was one from the farmers that they would furnish a certain number of hogs. The firm wanted to be sure of a sufficient supply to run the business profitably. Such a condition is not imposed by the gentlemen closely connected with the Armour's. Under their arrangement they get their interest paid by the government, so that the supply of hogs would be less important. The other concern having to earn its interest needs other raw material than a complainant government and a provincial guarantee.

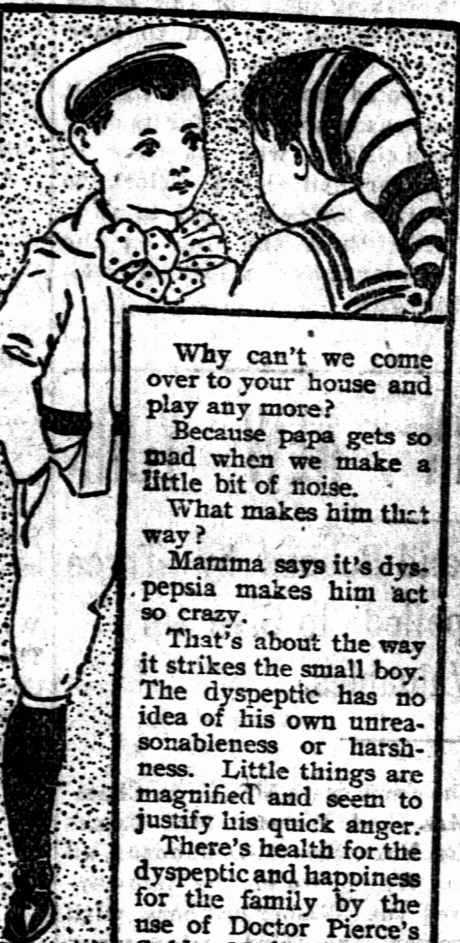
The St. John Globe (Liberal) upon the same subject editorially says: In Prince Edward Island there is matter of a political and financial kind which is attracting some attention. It appears that a pork packing concern called "The Dominion Packing Company" is operating on the Island. The Charlottetown Patriot some time ago said that their was an agreement between the company and the provincial government by which the latter undertook to endorse the company's five per cent bonds, the company agreeing to expend a quarter of a million in developing its business, half of this to be spent within six months, and a certain amount annually to be spent in labor. This pork packing company has now absorbed another already existing pork packing concern, but there are no definite statements as to the extent, to which the government is really involved. In the meantime another proposal has been made to the Island government by a Halifax concern, which offers to establish, equip and operate meat packing, canning and cold storage plants if some concessions are given, but these concessions do not include a guarantee of bonds, or any security. The Charlottetown Guardian says that the government could not accept this offer, as it was already bound by the agreement before made. Just what has been done nobody

seems to know. It will strike the ordinary person that it is a great stretch of authority for the government to undertake to endorse any company's bonds without legislative authority, and further than this, it seems a ridiculous thing for a government to enter into a partnership of any kind with a mercantile concern, particularly when so doing it, it will place it in a position to antagonize other mercantile business of a like kind. If this work is once begun, where will it end? If one kind of business, why not another? If one kind why not all? Are the people to be made tributary to all kinds of enterprises?

There should be a general pledge-signing campaign, says the Montreal Witness, throughout Ontario such as there has recently been in Great Britain, as a result of an earnest evangelism to that end. So moving have been the appeals to patriotism and to the golden rule that whole communities, have by majority, placed themselves voluntarily on the side of emancipation from the drink traffic. The mere signing of a pledge without a solemn realization of duty in the matter would amount to little, but the ministers throughout the land could so impress upon their hearers the evils caused by drink as they know them—who better—as to make men and women come forward with enthusiasm to register themselves as enemies to the death of their country's direct foe. There might or there might not be insistence on the duty of voters in connection with the referendum according to the convictions of the clergyman and the views of his congregation as to how far the Church should enlist itself in such a campaign. We think in the vast majority of congregations there would be no squeamishness about that being a fitting task for the Church to enlist in. But there would be very few congregations indeed that would find fault with their minister for getting every total abstinence pledge he could.
