Beauty? Truth, Prayer, Pity, Charity, Uprightness, Love

The hollyhocks, demure, attractive flowers of remembered gardens though not among the most dependable in ours, we tucked up this afternoon for their quiet winter sleep. We covered them, and others of their neighbors, loosely with the evergreen boughs James had brought us in nice gift from the wood-cutting up along the stream.

As we busied ourselves with the pastime, and entertained visions of the lovely blossoms we should have in another summer, we could hear the current song of the wood-lots. Over this or that field or boundary of fern it came, the sound of the power-saws used by the farmers who gathered their harvest of fuel-wood. A breath of breezes gave us the aroma of burning branches from the scene of ours, marked by the smoke which climbed darkly there, wandered a while and dissolved above the stream.

Hollyhocks we bedded. And the bushy clumps of Sweet William to give us, come another summer, the pretty shades of quaint velvet gowns of former years. And remembered that while we arranged protection for our plants, down south where our robin - birds now sojourn with never a thought yet of the forlorn nests in the birches at Alderley, yards have blossoms to spare.

In that sunshine land of California too, a little lady of grandmother wrole recently "My Mexican dahlia trees (tropical plants) are now orchid - tipped with bloom. I can also count six buds on one rosebush, as well as three almost full - blown roses. Another has several just bursting into that finest of rose - beauty, a partly - open bloom, which I think is prettier than a full - blown rose."

Ours we tucked to sleep. And along the valley, and up its rise there is no sign of blossom anywhere. Instead, the rich dark green of spruce and "var," of feathery hemlock and lowering pine, stand bright tipped at sunrise or delightfully silhouetted against the troubled glory of the December sunsets and await serenely the arrival of winter over the days.

across the lane. Enchanting dreams of her cousin's wedding tomorrow will come tonight to her pillow. At the moment, is she at her mirror setting a wave in her hair? Making wishes, as young misses will that when she grows she may be as interestingly beautiful? Not suspecting how lovely little girls are. What is beauty, one wonders?

We think of the Quaker woman's recipe for it? "I use, for my lips, truth; for my voice, prayer; for my eyes, pity; for my hands, charity; for my figure, uprightnes; for my heart, love." And know, how very true it is.

SENTENCED TO DEATH NAIROBA, Kenya (AP)—Peter Poole, 28-year-old Briton, Thursday was sentenced to death on a charge of murdering an African house boy, Kamawe Musunge.
