

Crash Cause Is Probed

WILLOW GROVE, Pa. (AP)—A U.S. Marine pilot, who ejected himself seconds before his jet crashed killing seven persons and injuring 17, said here he left the plane "at the barest minimum possible."

The plane, streaking at an altitude of 300 to 350 feet, approaching the Willow Grove naval air station Sunday, plunged in flames onto a nearby picnic ground.

The pilot, 30-year-old Capt. John W. Butler, a Marine Corps reservist from Bolling Springs, Pa., escaped injury when he ejected himself from his cockpit.

Butler, at a press conference, indicated the plane would have landed in the same place "even if I had stayed with the plane."

The press conference was called as high-ranking military officers started a hearing into the cause of the crash which brought tragedy to a private outing of families and friends.

NO RESPONSE
Butler said he got no response when he tried to level the plane on a routine mission with three other Marine planes. "I saw trees coming up—and ejected," Butler related. "I couldn't do anything about it at all. I am satisfied that it was the only thing to do."

A marine spokesman said the cause of the crash has not been resolved by a board of inquiry. It could have been a faulty electrical or hydraulic system, he said.
