Importance Of Home And School Ass'ns Emphasized

The importance of Home and School Associations was stressed last night by Dr. C.L. Gass of Tatamagouche, N.S. in speaking to a meeting of the Provincial Home and School Association in Prince of Wales College auditorium. Good buildings, good equipment, good curricula are all necessary and valuable he said. But they are secondary in effect to the friendly co-operation of the parent and teacher in a way that is made possible through Home and School Associations.

Dr. Gass was introduced by K.A. Parker, Supervisor of City Schools and thanked by Dr. L. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Education. A vote of thanks was also moved from the audience by Judge C. St. Clair Trainor and seconded by Austin Kennedy, both of Charlottetown. Reginald MacNutt, president of the Provincial Home and School Association, presided.

A Home and School Association, Dr. Gass noted, is a voluntary group of parents, teachers and others working together for the welfare of the children working in the field of education through the schools.

No improvement in the school is possible until it is demanded by strong public opinion. Your associations can help to mould a strong and an informed public opinion but they should never lend their efforts to assist pressure groups, the speaker cautioned.

Dr. Gass stressed that it is important to have school trustees on the association so the groups can work in harmony with the trustees, and the trustee board may be kept closely in touch with what the association is doing.

Following the meeting the delegates, guest speaker and visitors gathered in the library of the College for refreshments and a luncheon.

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ALAN FIELD, director of the Canadian government travel bureau, said \$300,000 was spent in advertising in United States publications to promote travel in the Atlantic Provinces. The conference last year agreed to a federal three-year plan to boost the tourist industry in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland.

Delegates from the Atlantic provinces said the program was a success. Mr. Field said of the total 650,000 enquiries received by the bureau from potential U.S. tourists to Canada; about 80,000 were for information on the Atlantic provinces.

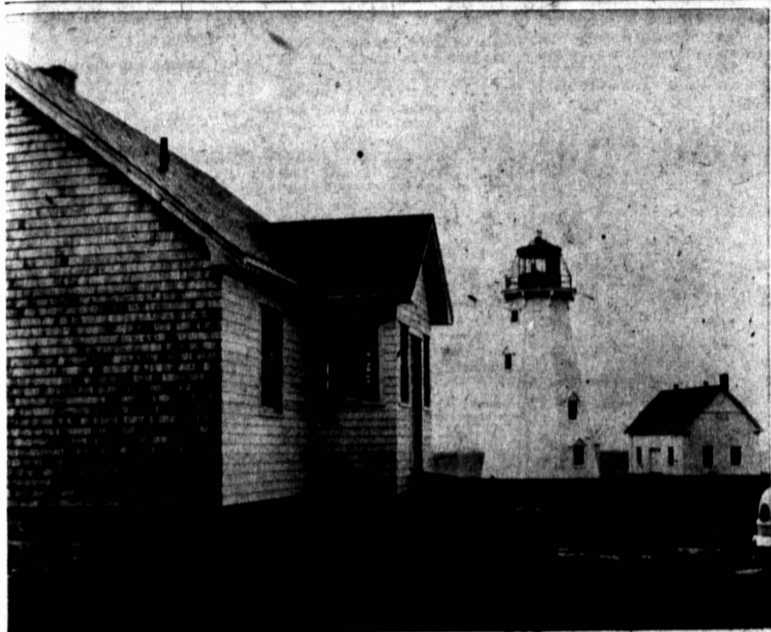

Canadians Are Great Tourists

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadians are a travelling people and they do most of their travelling by car. R. E. Grose, deputy minister of travel and publicity for Manitoba, Monday told delegates to a federal-provincial tourist conference that 53 per cent of the Canadian population travelled in July and August.

CROSS-COUNTRY STUDY
He based his estimate on "very preliminary" polls of a cross-Canada economic study being made of the Canadian tourist industry.

Those on holidays during the period spent an average eight days away from home and 84 per cent of them travelled by car. Persons visiting friends averaged seven days away, 75 per cent of them travelling by car. The average business trip took about five days, with 66 per cent of business men using cars.

Full results of the survey are expected to be completed by this time next year, Mr. Grose said. The cost, \$40,000, is being shared

by the provinces the federal government and the Canadian Tourist Association.
