

\$250,000 Gift Announced to Presbyterian College

Addressing the summer meeting of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island meeting in the Kirk Hall of St. James Church on Tuesday the Principal of Presbyterian College the Rev. Dr. Robert Lennox, stated that a gift of a quarter of a million dollars had recently been promised the college by a Montreal layman. This would be used to endow a professorial chair in the faculty of theology for the training of Presbyterian youth for the ministry.

Dr. Lennox went on to state that affairs in the college were now the happiest in its 14 years in the principalship, that five of the six chairs are now occupied by full-time professors and the sixth by a sessional lecturer, that student enrolment next year will reach the highest figure in more than twenty years, and that plans are now being made for the renovation of the college buildings with a \$225,000 Campaign.

The Presbytery was led by the Moderator, Rev. D. A. Campbell, in the chair, and the Clerk, Rev. T. H. B. Somers, at the desk.

Reporting on Camp Keir, Rev. E. H. Bean stated that the Presbytery Men's Council had wired the camp and that they would pay the cost of materials also. Reporting on the Deaconess Building Appeal, it was stated that 22 congregations in the Presbytery had so far sent in over \$3,200. It was announced that Rev. D. A. Campbell had been elected the Island's director on the Extension Fund Atlantic Limited of the Synod.

North Tryon and Bradshawe were made two separate mission fields with Rev. Geo. Killen as interim-moderator of the former and Rev. E. H. Bean still moderator of Bradshawe.

Review of the main features and decisions of the general assembly held recently in Toronto were given by Rev. T. H. B. Somers, Rev. D. A. Campbell, Milton Fraser and B. P. McLaine. Arrangements were made for the commencement of the ministry of the Rev. R. E. MacKenzie at Wood Islands and Caledonia with a service of recognition to be held in the church at Wood Islands on Monday, July 13th, at 8 p.m., conducted by members of the Presbytery.

The missions committee report recommended that the offer of the Eastern Division W.M.S. Board to appoint Miss Mary MacKenzie as deaconess-at-large in the Presbytery be accepted. This new work is to commence Sept. 1st.

Canada, Japs' Skills Linked

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada and Japan Thursday linked their scientific skills in the development of atomic energy for peaceful uses, especially in the field of electric power.

A bilateral agreement providing for co-operation by the two countries in harnessing the atom was signed here by External Affairs Minister Green and Japanese ambassador Toru Hagihara.

Mr. Green told the Commons after the signing ceremony that it is the hope and intention of the two governments that the agreement will provide the framework for mutually-beneficial co-operation between Canada and Japan in the development of peaceful uses of atomic energy.

The terms of the agreement provide for the signing of a contract by Japan for the purchase of Canadian uranium.

Mr. Hagihara said his country hopes to buy a fairly large quantity of uranium oxide later this year. Contract terms now were being negotiated with Eldorado Mining and Refining Limited, fed-
