## Railway Hearing In City Tuesday

The Board of Transport Commissioners will sit here on Tuesday to consider an application from the Canadian National Railway to discontinue most of the passenger-train service in the Province from mid-April to mid-November.

The railway proposes to abolish all passenger-train service except the daily train to and from the mainland for the eight month period.

A brief against the railway proposal will be presented by Premier A. W. Matheson on behalf of the Provincial Government and it is understood that briefs will also be presented by the Summerside Board of Trade, Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade, Souris Board of Trade and by H. W. Willis and Simmonds and MacFarlane on potato shipments.

Hon. Justice J. D. Kearney of Ottawa will preside over the hearing. It is not known which members of the Board will accompany him here. The Board is also conducting hearings at Halifax and Bathurst next week.

The hearing will be held in the Legislative Chambers and will commence at 10 a.m. Tuesday morning.

**RETURNING FROM ATTENDING TARIFF BOARD SITTINGS**  
Mr. W. R. Shaw, B. S. C., returned last night from attending a meeting of the Tariff Board, which convened its sessions to investigate the conditions of the Canadian potato industry. Mr. Shaw spent about ten days in Ottawa and previous to the Board Sessions, along with Mr. L. R. Stephens of Kiwona, B. C., the potato brief that was finally presented to the Board members. This brief was comprehensive in its scope and presented in detail the production, marketing and consumption picture, and the effects of the present tariff structure on the industry.

A large representation from all over Canada attended the two day sittings. Mr. Shaw was chairman of the potato representatives during the Sessions and presented for the Canadian industry the brief covering the first item indicated, while Mr. Stephens presented the latter portion.

During the presentation questions of a searching nature were asked, and every angle of the problem was explored by Board members. An opportunity was afforded during the opening brief to present the situation as it affects the Maritimes and Prince Edward Island in particular, and as a result,

further information on supplementary briefs was not required on many items. These statements came in from practically all of the provinces and there was undoubtedly great unanimity in outlining the difficulties with which the Canadian industry is contending.

Mr. Shaw reports that the Board showed every courtesy and co-operation with industry representatives and the sessions were conducted in a fine atmosphere of friendliness and efficiency. The potato committee of the Horticultural Council whose activities and representatives brought about this investigation will continue to supply the Tariff Board with information as desired, and it is expected that the Board's report will be prepared as an early date.
