Magistrate Dismisses Case Of Passing Over Solid Line

The case of Keir MacLeod, charged with passing over a solid white line, was dismissed by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens County Magistrate's Court yesterday. Constable Ian Oland, Charlottetown RCMP, testified the ac-

that the accused had passed the car south of the intersection and that the line there was broken.

The accused was represented by Kenneth R. MacDonald. Alan K. Scales represented the crown.

A Charlottetown youth, Gerard Stephen Malone, Queen Elizabeth Drive, pleaded guilty to throwing a beer bottle through the window of a car driven by Allan Orville Richardson, Stanhope, and was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days. Restitution had already been made, it was explained.

A man was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for illegal possession of liquor, and another was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days for

being intoxicated in a public place.

The case of Charles Earl Lund, Dorchester Street, Charlottetown, charged with reporting to the police an offense which had not been committed, was set over to Aug. 23 to fix a date for hearing.

Malcolm Leith MacPherson, Richmond Street, Charlottetown, was remanded to July 21 on a charge of theft of a wrist watch. The accused pleaded not guilty at an earlier court session.

Two Loiterers Get Suspended 20-day Sentences

Two Charlottetown men, Terence H. Smith and Wayne W. MacDonald, were given 20-day suspended sentences for loitering when they appeared yesterday in city police court. Magistrate A. J. Haslam, QC, remanded David Francis Howatt of Victoria to July 26 on a charge of obstruction of the law.

Ralph B. Dowling appeared on a speeding charge and was assessed \$15 and costs or five days. John MacInnis, city, was fined

\$25 and costs or 15 days for failing to stop at the scene of an accident.

There were five drunk and incapable cases on this morning's docket. Four were given similar fines of \$20 and costs or 30 days while a fifth was given a 20-day suspended sentence.

D. Frank Sigworth of Charlottetown, charged with drunken driving was given a remand without a plea being taken until July 26.

Ferry Traffic Continues To Increase

BORDEN — Increases in both passenger and vehicle traffic on Canadian National's Northumberland Strait ferry service for June have been reported by J. G. Davis, manager of CN's Maritime area. The service handled 49,058 passengers during the month, 593 more than in June, 1964. The number of vehicles carried increased by 1,109 to 21,438. The traffic was handled by

the MV Abegweit with 971 crossings, the SS Prince Edward Island, 147 crossings and the MV Confederation with 332 crossings. CN's charter bus service carried 1,518 passengers. The ferry service carried 17,039 cars, 2,585 trucks and 1,232 tractor trailers, 211 buses and 363 passenger trailers. Traffic figures for May also showed substantial increases over the same month in 1964 — Centennial Year. During May, passenger traffic increased to 40,334 and the number of vehicles to 18,282.
