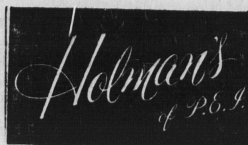

## Maria Devotion Called Christian Unity Barrier

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Three leading cardinals, including Canadian Paul-Emile Cardinal Leger, told Roman Catholic executives at the Vatican Ecumenical Council that excessive devotion to the Virgin Mary is a barrier to Christian unity.

The 2,500 prelates are from among all classes and races of mankind.

The warnings against over-emphasis on Marian devotion came as the Council Fathers took up the subject of Mary on the third day of the new council session in St. Peter's Basilica.

The issue of the Virgin Mary often has been a point of controversy between Roman Catholics and Protestants have criticized heavy emphasis on Latin America, as a form of idolatry.

Many Roman Catholic prelates from Latin America also have expressed concern and disapproval again at the council session Wednesday.

Raul Cardinal Silva Henrich of Santiago, Chile, told the council "many creatures talk too much of the veneration of Mary and not enough of that of Christ. This sometimes causes scandal among the faithful and among those outside the church."

He spoke for himself, for Jose Humberto Cardinal Quintero of Caracas and 43 other Latin American bishops.

The council session was closed, but briefing officers told reporters about the proceedings afterward.

Cardinal Leger, archbishop of Montreal, called for "more precision in our description of the relationship between Mary and the human race."

He criticized preachers who "sometimes exaggerate on Mary, causing piety in some, but turning others away."

The Vatican's outstanding specialist on Christian unity, German-born Augustin Cardinal Bea, asked for specific directives against abuses, as did Cardinal Leger.

## Education Ministers Request More Vocational Schools Aid

WINNIPEG (CP) — Canada's education minister here asked the federal government for more help in supporting vocational high schools built under a federal-provincial cost-sharing agreement.

They urged the government to assume 50 per cent of approved provincial expenditures for a support of vocational schools or departments operating under the program.

The schools were built under federal capital grants of 75 per cent with the provinces paying the remaining 25 per cent.

Basis of the operational grant structure was not spelled out in the resolution, but it was noted New Brunswick's education minister, said later in an interview the grants vary from province to province.

67 PER CENT OF COSTS

It was "pretty well established" at the ministers' meeting, he said, that these grants represent about six to seven per cent of the operational costs.

The ministers issued two resolutions following two days of closed talks at the first annual convention of the Canadian Education Association.

In the other one, they urged the federal government to increase its support to 75 per cent from 50 per cent of provincial costs of approved programs for training technical and vocational teachers under a federal-provincial program.

The resolution said "great difficulties are being experienced in recruiting suitable people as instructors in the new vocational schools, trade schools, and technical institutes built under the federal-provincial cost-sharing agreement."

## Ford, Chrysler Sign With Union

DETROIT (AP)—Last-minute labor contract settlements has averted strikes at two automotive giants in the U.S.

Ford Motor Company and Chrysler Corp.

The United Auto Workers Union won new three-year contracts covering 130,000 hourly employees at Ford and 100,000 salaried workers at Chrysler.

A Christmas bonus for Ford workers added some "frothing on the cake," but otherwise both contracts are upon substantially parallel the pact won for hourly workers at Chrysler last week.

Next, UAW President Walter Reuther moves to the giant of the U.S. auto industry, General Motors Corp., to seek the same or better terms. Showdown bargaining starts there Monday.

American Motors' Corporation still has not settled.

Contract negotiations with the Canadian plants of GM, Ford and Chrysler are to start later this year.

## Wet Weather Cuts Quality Of Wheat Crop

OTTAWA (CP)—Wet weather has reduced the quality of the Prairie wheat crop, the bureau of statistics said here.

Harvesting is in full swing after cool, wet weather but more than one-half remains to be done, with Alberta the last advanced.

There has been frost damage to grain kernels, especially in northern areas.

The bureau's report was based on wires from crop observers across Canada received up to Tuesday night.

This was the last of the 104 series of six telegraphic reports on crop progress.

Yields are good throughout the Maritimes. Prince Edward Island exports excellent grain and so does Nova Scotia's eastern counties.

Nova Scotia conditions are generally good in the Annapolis Valley and western parts of the province. Some army worm damage has occurred in grain fields in Nova Scotia's eastern counties.

New Brunswick farmers have harvested the grain. The crop is generally good despite army worm damage.

Quebec harvesting is completed in the Montreal region and the Ottawa Valley, and is well advanced in the lower St. Lawrence district and at Trois-Rivieres. Elsewhere, farmers are starting the harvest. Grain yields are variable. Potatoes yields are good despite blight damage.

## 11 Felt Firms In U.S. Charged With Price Fixing

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal charges of conspiracy to fix prices were disclosed against 11 felt manufacturers in the United States, including a company of which Republican vice-presidential candidate, William E. Miller is a director.

The Federal Trade Commission announced issuance of an order to prohibit the companies and their trade association, the Papermakers' Felt Association of Philadelphia, from conspiring to fix prices. Agreement to the order by the companies and the association did not constitute an admission that they had violated the law.

Miller, a lawyer in Lockport, N.Y., and former Republican party national chairman, is director of Lockport Felt Company Inc., Newfane, N.Y.

A spokesman for the company told a reporter the conspiracy charge was of long standing and, in his opinion, in no way resulted from any action by Miller. Company president Raymond J. Lee said "most of the industry practices complained of... were adopted by the Papermakers' Felt Association about 30 years ago."

Lee added in a statement to reporters: "These practices have never been formally rescinded by the association, although many are no longer followed by Miller because a director May 20, 1947.

The 11 companies produce papermakers' felt which is used on paper-making machines to remove water from the wet sheet or pulp.

Their sales total about \$45,000,000 annually.
