Central Guardian Should Have Made Clean Sweep With Live Hogs At Royal Fair Says Mr. Clay

Feeling very tired and suffering from a cold but happy over the showing which Island swine breeders made in the carcass competitions at the Royal Winter Fair, Mr. H. W. Clay, Senior Livestock man with the Dominion Department of Agriculture, arrived home from Toronto last night, after a strenuous two weeks at the Royal.

But he was not so happy over the livestock showing by Island swine and he did not lay the blame on the quality of the pigs.

The live swine were judged first and their carcasses later. While Island swine placed low in the livestock judging they cleaned up in the carcass competition much to the chagrin of the livestock judge.

"I guess I did you fellows dirty," the livestock judge told Mr. Clay afterwards. Mr. Clay himself stated that Island men should have made a clean sweep on the live ones.

The tremendous task of looking after all the Island swine and various details was taken care of by only three men, Messrs. Stirling Willis of Kingston of the Todd Troop; Harrison Green also of Kingston and Mr. Clay.

The task was more than they could handle and the energetic agricultural official collapsed on his feet. Mr. Clay lost fourteen pounds during the time he was at the Fair.

The carcass judging triumphs at the Royal did much to increase the reputation of Island swine breeders across the Dominion, he reported.

Willie Lund of Tracadie, whose bacon hog won the Brethour Trophy, emblematic of bacon carcass supremacy, received about \$123 for his trophy winning animal. The carcass was purchased by Canada Packers for 90 cents a pound.

The win was a sweet and surprising one for the young farmer from Tracadie who left Prince of Wales College several years ago to help his dad on the farm. The competition was the first one in which he had ever entered any animal.

The Todd Trophy winning carcass, owned by Stirling Willis, was bought for 75 cents a pound. Marshall Peters of Rollo Bay received 60 cents a pound for the Wilshire side on his reserve champion carcass in the Brethour competition.

Twenty out of the twenty-eight Island swine carcasses in the two classes were purchased by the Toronto Branch of Canada Packers.

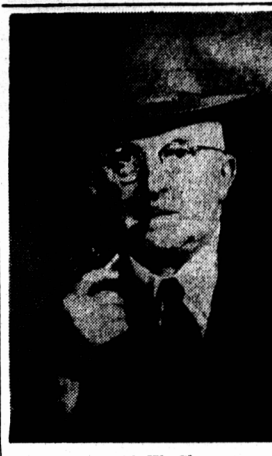

Maintains Potato Support Necessary

Commenting on the views expressed by a local potato dealer to the effect that artificial measures of any kind are useless in the present potato marketing emergency and that price support next spring would not be helpful, Mr. D. A. Macdonald, chairman of the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board, stated that in his opinion the producers of the Province would not be satisfied until ways and means were found whereby a surplus of any product, even though small, would be prevented from ruining the market for the whole volume of any crop produced.

"During the past several years price support as applied to various farm products has had a stabilizing influence far greater than some people want to think," Mr. Macdonald said. "Its merits are recognized by producers all across Canada, but unfortunately, certain interests, for reasons best known to themselves have become opposed to its continuation and want to go back to the old way of doing business as soon as possible."

"On the two previous occasions when support assistance was given to Maritime potato producers the benefits derived were quite substantial and the policy was a great benefit to the smaller growers who really need and should receive protection in a period of surplus supply caused by conditions over which they have had no control."

money. Speaking of the many services being offered the people, Mr. Bell said they were entitled to them and compared the greater revenues now received by the government than when the Conservatives were last in power. He was critical of the greater indebtedness of the Province now in view of the higher income. He claimed that the agricultural business was in a serious state at present and said he knew many good farmers who would have difficulty getting a crop in next year. He also asked for the restoration of the artificial insemination unit which formerly operated at the Experimental Farm here.

Other Speakers

The two candidates spoke only briefly asking for the support of the electorate next Monday, but each of them was supported by strong party debaters. On the Liberal side in addition to Premier Jones were Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Public Health, T. J. Kitcham, M.P., George Saville, M.L.A., Douglas MacKinnon, M.L.A., and Thomas Cullen. Speaking for Mr. Rogerson were Maj. John A. Macdonald, R. L. Burge, M.L.A., Philip Matheson, M.L.A., Walter MacKenzie and John MacLean, M.L.A. Chester Pratt was chairman of the meeting.

Major Macdonald was strongly critical of the lack of support for farmers on potatoes this year and compared the lack of it with the aid given apple and wheat growers in other provinces. Mr. Saville stated the Jones Government had done more for education in this province than all the other governments since Confederation. Philip Matheson expressed the opinion that our case for a potato support price "could not have been properly presented in Ottawa or their attitude would not be as it is."

Hon. Mr. Matheson in referring to his department said all social measures cost a great deal of money and that this year the department will exceed its estimates on Mothers Allowances by \$50,000 and asked "How can we go socially?"

Brief references were made to the operation of the Fishermen's Loan Board with the first question coming from the floor. Mr. Saville said because the matter was still before an investigating commission he would not comment on it now. However, "I never approved an application for a fisherman's loan that I did not believe I had a right to do."
