New Screen At Yeo Theatre First Time Tonight

"Tonight is the first showing in Montague of the new wide aspect ratio picture at Yeo's Theatre. The outstanding feature of the new screen, which has been installed, is that it presents a picture almost twice as wide as the former screen, thereby giving more detail and greater depth. Lighting for this new screen is provided by new high intensity arc lamps which bring out the color contrasts making the picture more realistic.

Mr. Yeo, a pioneer in motion picture exhibition for 35 years, has undertaken a complete remodeling of his theatre by constructing a new large lobby with canteen service. He has also installed the most modern projection equipment comparable with that of larger cities. Together with this he has plans to install new upholstered theatre chairs, which are already here. In the early spring, at which time will take place an official opening.
