Spring Park Incorporation To Be Decided By Plebiscite

"That a petition containing the names of 25 ratepayers in the district be presented to the Sheriff asking that he hold a plebiscite in regard to the incorporation of Spring Park Village" was the decision reached by a representative group of tax-payers at a meeting held last night in Spring Park Hall. Nineteen names were affixed to the petition at the meeting.

Mr. Edward Arsenault acted as chairman and explained the purpose of the meeting, which was to decide on a plebiscite. Some discussion took place on the boundaries of the village and the chairman was asked what agreement had been reached with Parkdale in regard to the territory which is the site of the Irving Oil Plant. Mr. Arsenault explained that nothing could be done about this matter at the present time, but that Parkdale would be willing to give the matter consideration at a future date, presumably after their annual meeting.

Council Approves Proposal For Ch'town Tourist Bureau

"This Council records its approval of the general project of the Charlottetown Board of Trade for a Charlottetown Tourist Bureau, including public rest rooms in the basement."

The above resolution was passed at a special meeting of the City Council yesterday at which the tourist promotion committee of the Board of Trade placed before the Council their views on the matter. They urged deeper civic interest in the valuable tourist traffic now enjoyed throughout the Province, and the possibilities of adding to the influx of visitors.

Mr. Earl Taylor, chairman of the Trade Board committee, said that the Board felt strongly the need of the city having a new tourist bureau centrally located and designed to give proper and adequate information. The possibility of erecting a suitable one-storey building, 30 by 40 feet on the present site of the city scale house on Market Square, was freely discussed. Mayor Stewart said that the Council had already agreed to have this removed to another site. Several Councillors remarked on the need of all available parking space in that part of the city.

Mr. Frank MacKenzie said that the committee anticipates waiting on Premier Matheson shortly with a view to engaging the interest of the Government in opening a city bureau which would benefit not only the city but all in the vicinity who cater to the tourist traffic. The ultimate objective calls for a three-way activity and interest on the part of the City, Board of Trade and the Government. The cost of the present inadequate rest-room facilities in the Market W. ments whose names have been chosen for the active force rifle and highland battalions, he said. The battalions of the Regiment of Canadian Guards will be known respectively as the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th battalions, Canadian Guards. The 1st and 2nd battalions of the Canadian Guards will be formed by drawing upon the RCR and PPCLI respectively when the 3rd battalions of these regiments return from Korea.

The 3rd and 4th battalions of the regiment will be formed from personnel of the 1st and 2nd Canadian Infantry battalions.

**Well-Known Regiments**  
The other four new battalions will be active force battalions of two well-known Canadian regiments, the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada and the Black Watch (Royal Highland Regiment) of Canada. They will replace the 1st and 2nd Canadian rifle battalions and the 1st and 2nd Canadian highland battalions respectively.

The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada and the Black Watch (Royal Highland Regiment) of Canada were selected as the names for the active force regiments because these are respectively the oldest rifle and highland regiments in Canada, with histories dating back to the earliest days of the Canadian militia. The present reserve force components—these units will continue to be known as the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada, and the Black Watch (Royal Highland Regiment) of Canada, and will retain their reserve status.

The 1st and 2nd battalions of the Royal Canadian Regiment, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry and the Royal 22nd Regiment, will continue to serve in the role of parachute battalions, of the mobile striking force and serve abroad in turn with the other battalions of the active force. Two Canadian artillery regiments are also affected by the changes. Henceforth, all field artillery regiments in the active force will be Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, the 79th Field Regiment, Royal Canadian Artillery, now with the 27th Brigade in Germany, and becomes the 3rd Regiment, Royal Canadian Horse Artillery. Two Properties Are Purchased By Experimental Farm

The recent purchase of two more properties by the Experimental Farm was announced last night by Mr. R. C. Parent, superintendent. One is a small block of land along the road running in back of the Farm and formerly owned by St. Dunstan's College. It will be used in future for forage crops and experimental work, but at present is used as a pasture. The second is the large Robert Hurry farm of 50 acres adjoining the Upton Farm of the Experimental Station. This is described by officials as a valuable property for future experimental work in pasture, contour farming and seed grain growing. The two new properties give the Experimental Station a total of 435 acres now. This includes the buildings, orchards and 20 represents practically all useful farm land with the exception of acres of woodlots. Mr. Parent expressed the belief that this offered one of the finest setups for experimental farm work to be found in Eastern Canada.

Divisional Council Approves Red Cross Budget Of \$40,000

The budget for 1954 was the main item for discussion at the main meeting of the Divisional Council, Canadian Red Cross Society, held yesterday afternoon at Red Cross Headquarters in Charlottetown.

Lt. Col. L. F. MacDonald, Provincial President, was in the chair and called on the chairman of the standing committees to give their reports which revealed a vast volume of work accomplished in the past few months and great expansion in all departments. Reports were presented as follows: Junior Red Cross, Dr. L. W. Shaw who stated that already 30 classrooms in the province have re-enrolled as Junior Red Cross Branches; Women's Work - Mrs. E. A. Foster who paid tribute to all the women of the province who made up the record number of articles of clothing for overseas during the 52-53 season; Crippled Children's Work given by Miss Darrach for Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, Chairman, which gave details of the children under treatment at the present time; Nursing Services - Miss Katharine MacLennan stating that there are now 16 Home Nursing Classes and many loans of sickroom supplies being constantly made; being conducted in as many centres in the province Canadian Red Cross Corps by Mrs. H. L. Palmer who reported members doing hospital visiting of veterans regularly; Blood Donor

Committee - Mr. F. A. Large who announced Clinics would again be held during the first week in December; Swimming and Water Safety given by Miss Suzanne MacKinnon for the Chairman, Rev. M. D. Dunbar; Campaign given by Mr. Edwin Johnstone for Brig. W. W. Redd, Chairman; First Aid - Dr. A. J. Murchison and Disaster Services - Mr. Gordon MacDonald. The President pointed out that the increased demands being made for the various services provided by the Canadian Red Cross Society in this province mean that the budget must be raised in order to adequately finance these activities.

A budget of 40,000 was finally approved by the Council to whom it was made clear that the finances of the P.E.I. Division - which raised about \$25,000 to date in its 1953 Campaign - have to be supplemented by the National organization to make up the difference between the amount raised and the amount needed to cover the cost of the various services.
