Churchill, Eisenhower, French Premier To Meet In June Scores Injured; Three Reported Killed In Springbank Community

Hog Export Embargo Clamped On 50,000 Sq. Miles Of Ontario

OTTAWA, (CP)—The Agriculture Department Thursday ringed southwestern Ontario with a sweeping 50,000-square-mile hog export embargo in a desperate attempt to prevent the tenacious hog cholera from spreading to other parts of the country.

Twenty-nine counties and the district of Muskoka are included in the major quarantine which stretches from just west of Belleville to Windsor and south to the north shore of Lake Erie.

Some 1,500,000 hogs—more than one-quarter of all the pigs in Canada—are fenced in the movement ban. Persons who try to move hogs outside the quarantine area will be liable to imprisonment or fine—or both.

Meanwhile, the virus disease is continuing to take its toll. Some 400 hogs were reported by the department to have either died or been slaughtered in the week since the infection was first uncovered. More are likely to be destroyed.

Farmers are being paid compensation at the rate of about \$30 for a market hog and \$50 for a purebred animal.

At Toronto, Dr. G. H. Collaunt, the federal district veterinarian, said the hog cholera outbreak is "the most widespread the province has ever experienced."

The last serious outbreak was in 1947 in two counties of the Windsor-Chatham area.

Verdict Of Accidental Deaths In Plane Crash

A verdict of accidental death was returned last night by a coroner's jury at the inquest into the deaths of Joseph Gillan and Wendell Ferguson killed Sunday in a plane crash at Twin Rivers Airport, Johnston's River.

In the case of Gillan the jury found a verdict of accidental death from injuries in the crash of the plane which he was piloting in a steep climb at too low an altitude. The jury found that Ferguson came to his death in the same accident while a passenger in the plane.

Dr. J. Harold Shaw, Provincial Pathologist, was the first witness. He had performed an autopsy on the victims of the crash and said severe external injuries were indicative of the application of severe force and several fractures had resulted. Death was practically instantaneous, he stated.

Mr. Pius Blackett, part owner of the crashed plane, said he had telephoned Mr. Gillan at noon Sunday and was to meet him later to go flying. He got to the airfield and wheeled the plane from the hangar. Mr. Gillan then came along and climbed into the front seat. He first took Joseph McGarrity and his own young son for a flight.

Montreal Man To Hang For Murder Of Woman

Sim was arraigned on charges of conspiracy and hold-up. He pleaded guilty to the conspiracy charge but refused to plead to the hold-up offence. Crown counsel said it was willing to withdraw the second charge.

Scores Injured; Three Reported Killed In Springbank Community

SARNIA, Ont., (CP)—A tornado roared into Sarnia from the southeast for one horrifying minute late Thursday. It toppled parts of buildings in a destructive course through the business section of the city. Damage ran into the millions of dollars.

In Sarnia there was one reported death, although this was still unconfirmed three hours after the storm hit at 5:42 p.m. E.D.T. In neighboring Port Huron, Mich., three were reported killed. Hospitals in the two cities reported hundreds of casualties, few serious. Most were hurt by flying glass.

The Windsor Daily Star received a report from its Sarnia bureau saying there were no deaths there but scores were injured. The Star bureau said damage in Sarnia was confined to an area of seven or eight blocks in the downtown section.

The quick blow left Sarnia's main business thoroughfare, Christian street, a shambles. It was piled with debris from buildings. Two stores were blown off the Vendome hotel and two off the Imperial Bank building.

Without Power The city of 42,000 was without power, at least until Friday. Telephone service was limited. Twelve girl employees of the Bell Telephone Company were taken to hospital for treatment of cuts from flying glass. The telephone building was hard hit.

Special police were sworn in to help and 200 Canadian soldiers were brought in from nearby Camp Borden.

The tornado, which twisted away east from here across southwestern Ontario and swung north of London, toppled trees, overturned cars, demolished houses and blew in windows. The full (Continued on page 15, Col. 3)

Police Re-open Probe In Death Of N.S. Woman

HALIFAX, (CP)—Police are awaiting a pathologist's report on the exhumed body of a Cape Breton Island woman following an announcement of extended investigation into her Feb. 16 death.

Provincial pathologist Norman G. B. McLetchie examined the body of 35-year-old Mrs. Eunice Eliza Elizabeth MacRae of Nyanza, near Baddeck, N. S., who perished in a fire at her farm home. He has not yet made his report.

Britain Advises 4,000 Civilians To Leave Egypt

LONDON, (AP)—Britain has ordered a diplomatic trouble-shooter to Egypt as an "emergency measure" and confirmed that non-essential British civilians have been urged to leave the tense Middle East country.

The foreign office announced Thursday that Robert Hankey, 48-year-old minister to Hanoi and an expert on Middle Eastern affairs, will fly to Cairo next Saturday. He will take over temporarily from Sir Ralph Stevenson, present ambassador to Egypt, who is returning to Britain on sick leave June 1.

There was no indication as to how long Hankey would remain in Cairo. He is going there during a deepening crisis between Britain and Egypt which has threatened further nationalist demonstrations against Britain's big garrison in the Suez canal zone.

Anglo-Egyptian negotiations have been suspended and Egypt's strong man, Gen. Mohammed Naguib, has stepped up his threats to oust the British from the Suez Canal.

Britain has refused to hedge unless Egypt agrees to join other Western allies in a Middle East defence pact guaranteeing the vital Suez area.

The foreign office also said the British embassy in Cairo has advised some 4,000 British civilians in Egypt to leave the country if they have no pressing business there.

HONG KONG, (AP)—The name of Red China's labor minister, Li Li San, has vanished from the Communist press and radio, stirring speculation that the first top-level head has rolled in Beijing.

The tense, fanatic, pro-Russian Red wasn't even mentioned in reports from the All-China Congress of Trade Unions, a huge Red China meeting May 2-11 that ordinarily would have been under his thumb.

Disappearance by omission is nothing new in Communist countries. Often deaths—natural or otherwise—are not announced. The name of an official simply vanishes from that country's news.

HONG KONG, (AP)—The name
