

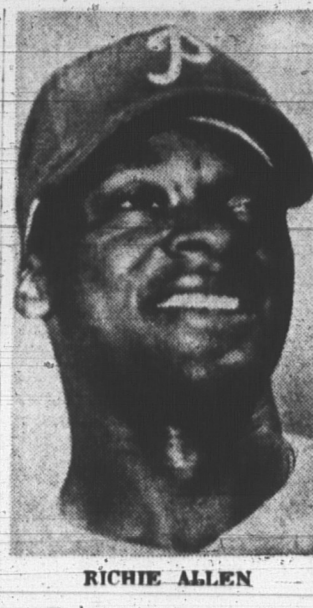
# Red Sox Blank Twins; Baltimore Blasts Sox

BOSTON (AP)—Earl Wilson blanked Minnesota Twins for eight innings and struck out a ninth-inning uprising Thursday as Boston Red Sox won 7-2 for their seventh victory in the last eight games.

Wilson, who had won five of his last six decisions, allowed only one runner to reach third until the ninth. He struck out nine and walked only one. Jimmie Hall's homer in the ninth, followed by singles by Bob Allison, Bernie Allen and pinch hitter Don Mincher gave the Twins their runs.

The Red Sox shelled Minnesota ace Mudcat Grant with four runs in the second inning and Wilson was in command the rest of the way.

Zolte Versailles started the game with a double, but Wilson retired the next 14 batters in order before Allen beat out an infield hit with two-out in the fifth.

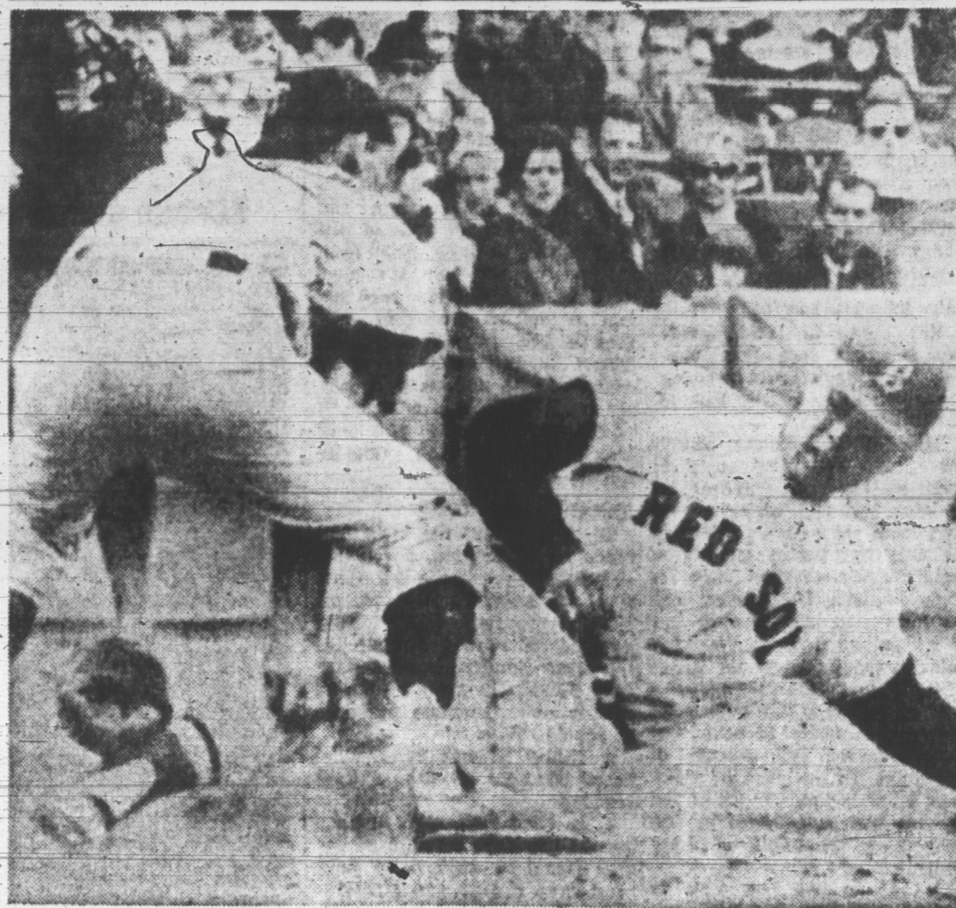
Bowens delivered a two-run single to highlight a three-run fourth inning rally.

The P.E.I. Amateur Baseball Association held their annual meeting last evening and nine leagues and areas were in attendance. Summerside, North Rustico, Cardigan, Montague, Murray Harbour, Murray River, Charlottetown all were represented as were both the Kings and Prince County baseball leagues.

Much business was discussed at the meeting but the main item of the agenda was the election of new officers and they are as follows: Honorary President, George Francis; President, Jack Kane; first vice president, Tim MacGuigan, second vice president, Charles Campbell; secretary, Dave Boswell; treasurer, Charlie Ryan, directors (Kings County) Pete MacMillan (Queens County) Jim Fox and (Prince County) Gerald Keough.

The new executive was vested with the power to investigate the possibilities of entering the National baseball tournament to be held in Newfoundland this summer and the representatives also heard a report by Hank Landry on last season's provincial and National team.

Jack Kane opened the meeting with a report on last season's provincial activities which included both provincial and Maritime playdowns, the Provincial clinic and other information. Charlie Ryan gave the report on the National Federation and also the treasurer and umpire in chief accounts. Both Prince and Kings Counties submitted their reports and Don LeClair elaborated on the activities of the local instruction programme.

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# Intercollegiate Union Accepted, CMHA Branch

MONTREAL (CP)—The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association voted Thursday to accept the Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union as an associate member.

At the fourth plenary session of the CAHA's 50th annual meeting, the association also reviewed the success of its Allan Cup and Memorial Cup playoffs.

Lloyd Pollock of Windsor, Ont., CAHA second vice-president, reported that the six-game series between Edmonton Oil Kings and Oshawa Generals, which Edmonton won 4-2, netted the CAHA \$40,000 at the gate.

Pollock said the series had been played in Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens because Oshawa's home rink was not available at the time and because of the close proximity of the two cities.

"Television of the games was a good break-through and did not affect the live gate that much," he said. "The Gardens people now feel that TV has helped junior hockey crowds."

Pollock said—that under the current television arrangements 25 per cent of the revenue derived goes to the building, 25 per cent to each team, and 25 per cent to the CAHA.

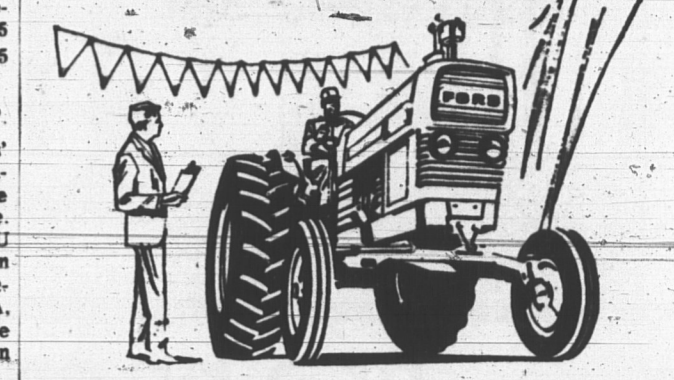
